

Veterans' Training —News and Views

The great majority of such ex-service men and women who desired training of some kind have already been trained or are now on courses. In other words, we have definitely passed the peak, and training classes are now contracting instead of expanding, as they were up to November or December 1946. There is still a sizeable number of veterans, however, who have delayed making application for training because of some profitable though temporary type of employment or for some personal reason, and these people would do well to remember that the final date for application is December 31, 1947. This date applies to all who were demobilized prior to 1947 except pensioners.

As training requirements lessen instructors are released, and many Rehabilitation Training Centres across Canada have already been closed out. Here in Prince Edward Island we have reduced the training staff and courses to correspond with reduction in numbers seeking training.

Mr. Joseph O'Hanley of St. Peters, who has been a Field Representative of Canadian Vocational Training since it was organized here, ceased work with C. V. T. on April 30. So also did Mr. Clarence W. E. Foster of Marshfield, who has been Field Representative of Charlottetown for more than a year. Both these men rendered valuable services to the ex-service men who were training-on-the-job, but as the number declined from a peak of 78 to a little over 40, and is still going down, it was judged that one Field Representative could look after the affairs of the T. O. J.'s after May 1, 1947. Mr. E. J. Sullivan of Summerside is now sole Field Representative for P. E. I. and is working out of Charlottetown as his headquarters.

The staff of the C. V. T. Training School in Charlottetown was compelled to make one reduction thus far. Mr. Sam Martin, the able instructor in Sheet Metal, was released lately when the number taking Plumbing, Pipe-fitting and Sheet Metal had declined to the point where one instructor could manage. There are still fourteen men on this course, which is quite a heavy load for Mr. Matt Lee, the sole instructor now; but graduations appear likely to exceed intake from now on.

It was with profound regret that C. V. T. announced some time ago that the courses in Agriculture and Farm Mechanics would have to be closed out altogether in May or June because of lack of students. These excellent courses were not well patronized by our ex-service men returning to farms, although this column has extended special pleas from time to time. It is understood too that the Counsellors of the Department of Veterans Affairs and the officials of the Veterans Land Act have recommended such training to men they have interviewed. There is a rumor that our Provincial Government is considering the establishment of a full time school in Agriculture; Mr. Robert Snazelle, the Supervisor of Agriculture in Rehabilitation Training, and Mr.

Lloyd O'Brien, the instructor in Farm Mechanics, should be useful men in any new training programme.

At the present time there are thirteen men in Electricity-Construction, for which there is one full time instructor and one half time. Mr. John Kirby took over instructional duties here last February, and is now in charge of this training, though able to devote only half his time to it. His assistant is Mr. Charles MacLean, who came to this position last March. These two bright young men should be able to turn out well trained graduates.

The waiting list of men for training at No. 1 C. V. T. School, Charlottetown, is now very small indeed. In fact it consists right now, May 21, of two names, both of whom are waiting for Brick-laying and Plastering. Not long ago new classes were taken into training in Carpentry, Electricity, and in Plumbing, Pipe-fitting and Sheet Metal, when all then on the waiting list were accepted.

A rate is incurred by any veteran who puts off making his application for course until near the end of this year, because as the numbers in training and awaiting training get small, courses are apt to be closed out or at least assistant instructors laid off. In the event of a great influx of applications coming next November or December there might not then be sufficient training facilities remaining in our centre here, and these men would then have to be sent to some other province for training.

On May 14 a Maritime Conference Rehabilitation Training was held in Halifax, N. S., to which Canadian Vocational Training, The Department of Veterans Affairs and the National Employment Service all sent representatives. This Province was represented by Mr. L. W. Shaw, Director of Education who is also Regional Director of Rehabilitation Training; and Major H. H. Court, the Superintendent of Rehabilitation Training. It was announced during the Conference that New Brunswick plans to concentrate all its veteran training at Moncton, by next September, except the Engraving and Jewellery Repair and the Radio Servicing which are both located in St. John, Nova Scotia. It is planning to close its centres at Windsor and Pictou and concentrate all training at Halifax and North Sydney. During the discussions or training it was revealed that the reduction in applications is general in all three provinces, and that very few are being delayed for courses except in Watch Repairing, Barbering and Bricklaying, where substantial waiting lists still exist.

When the programme of training began there was an understanding between the Federal and Provincial authorities that so long as the programme continued every facility would be placed at the disposal of the veterans classes. As this phase of vocational education in this Province draws to a close the new vocational wing and its equipment will gradually become available for a variety of courses in the vocational field in which all interested will be free to participate.

No Steel Strikes In U. S. For Two Years

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 23—(AP)—President Philip Murray today issued an order to the 3,000 locals of the United Steelworkers (C.I.O.) forbidding strikes for the next two years.

Murray, also president of the Steelworkers, said in a letter to local Union leaders that recently signed two-year contracts "for most of the members of our Union in basic steel and fabricating plants" constitute "one of the most notable achievements in the annals of our nation's collective bargaining history."

Fathers Day Once More

TORONTO May 23 — Father's Day will be marked throughout Canada on Sunday, June 15, it was announced today by N. L. Birrell, of Toronto, chairman of the Canadian Father's Day Committee. The committee, which includes representatives from across the Dominion, has as its objective to "honor dad—builder of our children's future."

Recognized throughout the United States and Canada for the past 20 years, Father's Day was not widely marked during the war years when so many men were in the armed forces. This year will mark the first formal observance in more than six years.

Simplicity Keynote Of New Stamp

OTTAWA, May 23—(CP)—Simplicity will be the keynote of Canada's new citizenship stamp, to be issued July 1 as a special commemorative issue, it was disclosed today.

A six-by-10-inch photograph of the stamp—a four-center which probably will be blue in color—depicts a young man, right arm upraised and wearing an open-necked shirt. He stands against a background of cumulus clouds, one foot partly in Hudson Bay and the other on the Prairies, on a rough map of the Dominion.

Only lettering on the stamp, apart from the postage figure, is "Canada" at the top and "Citizen-Citizen" at the bottom.

It will be the same size as the Bell commemorative stamp now in circulation.

28 Acquitted In Lynching Case

GREENVILLE, S. C., May 23 — All 28 defendants were acquitted on all counts by a Greenville County jury here tonight of charges of lynching a South Carolina negro.

In 98 separate verdicts, read in a jam-packed court room, the Greenville County jury acquitted 21 defendants of murder, in the lynching of negro Willie Earle last Feb. 17.

The jury also freed all 28 defendants of charges of conspiracy to commit murder, and of accessory before the fact.

Judge J. Robert Martin made no comment on the verdicts.

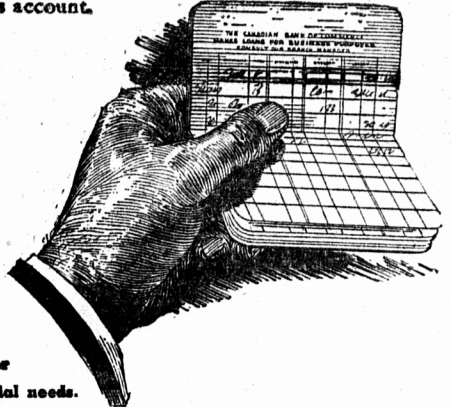

Charge Boys Attempt To Wreck C.P.R. Train

WEST BURK, Vt., May 23—(AP)—Three nine-year-old boys were rounded up by railroad police today on charges of attempting to wreck the northbound "Alouette"—track Canadian Pacific Railway Boston-Montreal express.

Two 40-pound stones were found on the track near here yesterday near the "summit"—the boundary of the watersheds of the St. Lawrence and Connecticut Rivers.

Running into the stones, the train knocked them aside and held to the tracks. A trainman was slightly injured. After a delay, the express continued its run.

D. of S. of T. of P. E. I., ask the Attorney General's department to publish monthly reports as to the number of permits issued to residents of this province, showing the number held by men and women separately.
