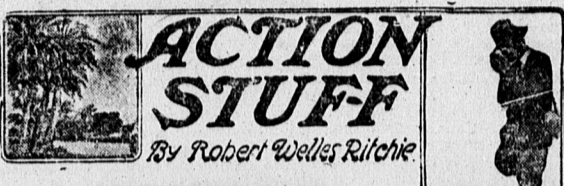

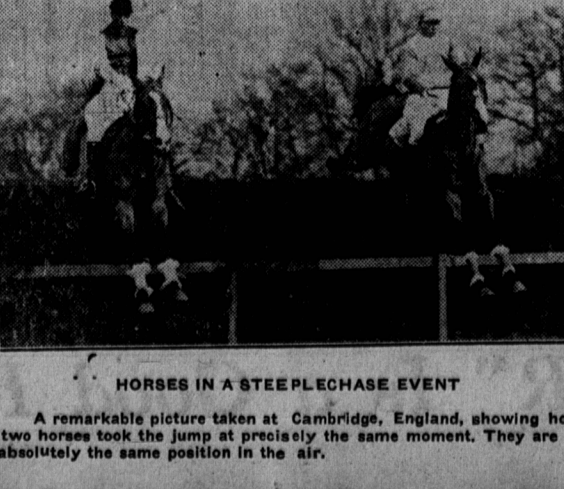
THE VOICE OF THE MOB

Then the pack eddied around the carriage caught sight of our white faces. "Ah-h-h! Gr-r-r-ri-ngoes!" Will I ever forget the gutteral bester note in that cry? The victoria began to tip over. Then Edmonds's brain functioned. He leaped from the tilted vehicle to the sidewalk. "Viva Madero!" he shouted. I feebly echoed his shillbottle. "Brava!" came a voice from the mob. Then, "Viva gringos!" was reared at us. And the shadow of a very ugly death passed from us.

Kane gets from \$50 to \$150 for a transfusion.
