ROTARY MEETING.—A very interesting address on Folk Songs in Scandinavia was given at Rotary Club yesterday by Professor Lloyd Shaw, who described folk music as expressing the lives and environment of the people from which these songs had sprung. At first the speaker explained, they originated among the unlettered and uncultured but today they are being sung by all classes of people. Mr. Shaw also dwelt on the important place which music has in the school system of Scandinavia. He discussed his personal impressions of these as formed during his trip to that country. A number of the folk songs were then artistically interpreted by Mrs. Arthur E. Roper who sang Italian, Russian, Polish and Norwegian songs. Accompaniments to these were played by Mrs. K. S. Rogew. Past President William M. Rows was in the chair yesterday. The guests being past Rotarians Harry South and Norman Lowther. Mr. Arthur Belcher, Manager of the Bank of Montreal, who was recently elected a Rotarian, was introduced by Rotarian Tweedy. The Rotary charge was delivered by Past President Hon. W. J. F. MacMillan. The officers who were nominated at a previous meeting by the nominating committee were declared elected, viz: President, W. A. Stewart, M.L.A.; Vice-President, George J. Tweedy; Secretary, James S. Harris; Treasurer, Roy McLure. Other members of the executive committee are G. F. Hutchinson, (retiring President), Major J. MacKenzie and Stewart Irvine.

Distress General Among Residents Of Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 7.—Cold official figures reveal widespread distress among Newfoundland's population. The rows of neatly tabulated statistics, to the casual reader, tell nothing of suffering among a poverty-stricken people, of hunger and want; but behind them lies the grim truth that close to one-third the population of Newfoundland received the dole during March.

The statistics were released by the Department of Health and Public Welfare. Here, in brief, is the story they tell: about 84,000 persons were on the dole in March. It cost the country \$136,879.98 to maintain them. The total cost of the dole for the first nine months of the current fiscal year has been \$734,189.30.

What the figures do not tell is how 84,000 persons managed to live on \$136,879.98 for a month. Arithmetic reduces it to \$1.63 per person per month. Many found partial sustenance through the fishery or through farming. But for many more this sum must have represented a "dispendous" problem. It is more than an economic issue, the paper says, it is a psychological issue. "Thousands of people who have been unable to find work or have worked and met with misfortune, are now so discouraged that they have sunk into an apathy from which they must now be roused." But progress is being made. The statistics show that the number of persons on relief in March was less than in the same month last year. The total dropped from around 88,000 to 84,000. At the same time, the cost was reduced from \$151,878.98 to \$136,879.98.

Valley Planning Blossom Festival When Trees Bloom

KENTVILLE, N. S., May 7.—Community promoters of the Annapolia Valley's Blossom Festival have chosen the first four days of June this year for the second annual carnival of the apple flowers. The trees will be just blossoming then through the countryside and a solid mass of color will stretch down the sheltered valley's 120 mile length.

Bright promise of the harvest to come, the spectacle draws thousands of visitors yearly. And this year it will be augmented by picturesque festivities — parades, folk-singing, colorful pageantry, memorial services on the spot made historic by the English expulsion of the Acadians.

Maritime Fish Catches Bigger

HALIFAX, May 7.—With larger catches and slightly better prices, fishermen of the Maritime Provinces came through the winter in high hopes of making 1934 a year of recovery.

Another advance was scored in March when 13,004,300 pounds of fish valued at \$264,000 were landed, compared with 10,122,900 pounds valued at \$192,204 in the same month of 1933. Added to increases of several months, the figures announced by the Eastern Fisheries Division created a brighter outlook all along the coast.
