There was good demand for cattle at steady prices. Good steers made \$6.25 to \$6.75 with choice steers up to \$7 and an odd lot of \$7.25. Medium steers were from \$5.50 to \$6 and common \$4 to \$5.25.

The few spring lambs offered were sold at \$6 to \$7.50 each; sheep were sold in mixed lots at \$4 to \$5.65.

WINNIPEG, April 18 (CP)—A buying flurry that found few sellers punctuated a listless grain session here today. Wheat: future losses of almost a cent, that price reversed at the close with final values 3-4-3-8 cent higher.

Winnipeg followed Chicago to higher and as the southern market strengthened on decrease of more than 2,000,000 bushels in United States visible supply, high prices and confirmation of frost damage in the Texas panhandle.

Cash wheat dealings were slow, similar to futures trading which was said to be the highest in weeks. No. 1 and 2 northern grades eased a cent to 16 and 6 cents premium above the May future. No. 1 durum was off more than a cent.

Stocks Suffer Setback On New York Mart

NEW YORK, April 18 (AP)—Stocks about-faced in today's market, as inflation fever cooled and a battle over phases of the Administration's "pump-and-prime" program loomed in Congress.

While volume dwindled substantially on the seaboard, leading industrialists that rallied sharply last week gave up fractions to 3 or more points.

The Associated Press average of 80 issues was off .7 of a point at 40.8. Transfers amounted to 857,160 shares compared with the two-hour turnover of 1,057,800 Saturday and 1,009,480 in full Thursday session.

Grains and issues were divided on a sluggish Canadian list. Dome advanced 1-8 points to 53 and Brazilian 1-8 to 10 1-2. McIntyre and Imperial Oil were steady.

Fractionally down were Massey Frictionless, Ford, Walkers and International Nickel.

International Telephone, with important properties in Spain, was the most active stock on the board, falling 1-2 by probabilities the civil war in that country would end quickly.

The majority of rails and utilities held declines to minor fractions.

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BARBER LARDER

Douglas A. Mutch, Northern Ontario Mining Engineer, in his Mutch's Mining Service bulletin of April 1st, states as follows:

"Cutting of the station at the 1st level at 125 ft. has been completed and sinking resumed to the next objective at 250 ft. It has been decided to run short cross-cuts to the ore zone on the first two levels before continuing sinking to the shaft objective at 550 ft., with two additional levels to be established at 375 and 500 ft. It is expected that lateral work will be getting under way on the first two levels towards the end of April, or early in May.

MARK EUROPE FOR FITNESS

MONTREAL, April 11 (CP)—Greater stress on physical fitness among Canadian youths is urged by P. M. Van Wagner, assistant director of physical education at McGill University.

European nations are promoting programs of games and outdoor recreation to strengthen the morale and physical equipment of their young people and Canada should follow suit. Van Wagner told a Montreal service club.

"The urge in some of these countries may be to prepare for defence, but if physical fitness is desirable in times of war is it not equally desirable in times of peace?" he asked.

"The opportunity for regular organized play, under trained leadership, should be available to every boy and young man. A good deal is now being done but much more remains to be done. I hope that in the not too distant future our schools will be in a position to carry out a much broader play program than they are at present able to do."

Van Wagner deplored the fact that Montreal students were not taking so prominent a part in other Dominion's sports as in other requirements of the province, which include the necessary practice, coaching and practice.
