Cape Breton Horses Take Free-For-All

Quinla Falls In Third Heat To Throw Col. MacKinnon, Her Owner, From The Sulky—Horse And Driver Uninjured.

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 27.—The Cape Breton community horses, Lambert Todd and Pale Face provided thrills at the Nova Scotia Exhibition races in the junior free-for-all this afternoon. All three heats were hard fought. Todd coming up to win the second and third. Quinla, 2:04 1-2 fell in the third heat, throwing Col. MacKinnon, owner and driver, out of the sulky, but neither horse nor driver were injured. Ruby Aubrey, from Summerside, won the 2:21 trot in straight heats from the favorite, Peter Wilton, Junior, of Charlottetown.

EGG MARKETS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 27.—There are no price changes reported from egg markets today but the general tone on the large eastern markets is slightly easier. Toronto, this market is weaker under slightly heavier receipts. Prices are ruling unchanged at previous quotations. Montreal. This egg market is quieter and buying demand in a jobbing way is less keen. Supplies are quite plentiful and prices unchanged.

INCREASED RAILWAY TRAVEL IN EAST

MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—The coming weekend, bringing as it does the last holiday of the summer season, Labor Day, will see decidedly increased railway travel throughout the whole of Eastern Canada. Extra equipment will be necessary on most of the trains, according to H. H. Melanson, general passenger traffic manager of the Canadian National Railway, and on some routes extra trains will have to be added.

"Arrangements are being made to look after a very heavy influx from the United States," said Mr. Melanson. "The volume of traffic to Toronto, for the exhibition will be at its peak, and travel to Ottawa and Montreal, to local points and to the Maritimes, will be ample evidence of the urge, to make the most of the season before it goes.

TO THE LATE H. A. HILL, B.A., HELD AT FRASER MEMORIAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ALBERTON, BY THE REV. KEIR FRASER, D.D., OF RENFREW, ONTARIO

A service which will be remembered by the people of Alberton, especially those of the Presbyterian Church, was held on Sunday, Aug. 26th. The Rev. Dr. Fraser had charge of the service.

In a few words Dr. Fraser spoke fittingly and kindly of the work that the late Mr. Hill had done while acting minister of the Presbyterian Church there.
