AN AMBITIOUS PROJECT.

As is well-known the Canadian Pacific Railway Company have received notice terminating the running powers they have over the Intercolonial Railway between St. John and Halifax. It may be expected that a new arrangement will be made to take the place of the old, as it is reasonable should be done. But failing this there is a well-defined rumor that the C. P. R. have projected a scheme to build a line of their own from St. John to North Sydney and arrange with the Reid company in Newfoundland for making a through route over their steamers and railway. The object of the C. P. R. is said to be to form a through line between Canada and Europe to compete with New York for passenger and mail traffic.

It is to be observed that with running powers over the Intercolonial this plan might be carried out quite as successfully as by the building of a new line from St. John to North Sydney, and the existing first-class line of the government road is amply sufficient for all the traffic that will offer, even if it should be many times the volume of that now passing over the line. It would be a regrettable mistake to parallel a well-built existing line where the present and prospective traffic can be well accommodated by the present road.

From Ireland to Newfoundland the steamers of the near future will be able to run within three days. Across Newfoundland the railway trip to Port-au-Basque can be made in nine hours, and thence to North Sydney the steamer makes the trip in six hours, and can do it in a half hour less. This would make the shortest trip between the old world and the new, and when once established would command a very large share of the trans-Atlantic travel and mail service. The thousands of passengers who look upon an ocean passage with more or less fear and dread would be delighted with a route by which they need be only three and a half or four days on the water. By this means the C. P. R. would not only have the fastest Atlantic line, but would also have a line direct from the Mother Country to India, all under one capable and energetic management. Such an enterprise in successful operation would be a credit to and a good advertisement also for Canada. It is quite feasible, and if undertaken by the C. P. R. would undoubtedly prove a great success. The management of the great trans-continental railway and the Pacific steamship lines have abundantly proved their capacity for handling the largest ventures in this line.

The island of Panay in the Philippine group of which the rebels are reported to have full possession, has an area of 4,633 square miles.

The Paris Ganloi's announces that henceforth the motto, "God protects France," will not appear on new French coins. Just now France is looking to Russia as her protector. She has made a bad exchange.

The King of Barotse land, in South Africa, has decided to come in under the British flag. The new British possession is situated on the upper Zambesi, in south latitude 15 on the borders of Portuguese West Africa.

It is interesting to note that the new Chinese minister of Washington is a Christian man, a member of the Church of England. One member of his suite also belongs to a well-known Christian family in Hong Kong, and nearly all of the embassy speak the English language.

Our despatches tell that the Hooley revelations are proving most discouraging to the Conservative party. That was to be expected. What adds to the gravity of the situation is that Mr. Labouchere, in Truth, says the Liberals are just as bad as the Tories, and he actually mentions by name a "noble" lord who paid in cash for his title!

Some days ago the GUARDIAN spoke of the infectious nature of a good example and now we have to record the offer of Mr. W. J. Gageor Toronto, to be one of the nine who will join with Hon. D. Farquharson in giving \$100 each toward the public library, if ten persons can be found to thus make up \$1,000 between them. This offer of Mr. Gage is as unexpected as it is generous and entitles him to the gratitude of all Charlottetonians. Only eight more are now needed to make up the \$1,000.

During more than a quarter of a century past the political pendulum in presidential elections has swung regularly forward and backward every four years. The record is: 1872 - Grant, Republican. 1876 - Tilden, Democrat. 1880 - Garfield, Republican. 1884 - Cleveland, Democrat. 1888 - Harrison, Republican. 1892 - Cleveland, Democrat. 1896 - McKinley, Republican. If the swing keeps its regularity of movement the next president will be a Democrat.

The esteemed Examiner figures the present government majority in the legislature to be only four, and counts confidently on the events of the near future to sweep away all that remains. It is to be observed, however, that great things are sometimes accomplished with small majorities. One of the most important measures of reform in our Island affairs—the abolition of the upper chamber of the legislature—was made by a provincial ministry that had only a majority of one in the house. Of course it is good policy in an opposition journal when a government is too persistent in retaining power, to adopt Captain Bobadil's method of defeating an army, which was to "kill them by cmoputation."

There are two widely different estimates of the youthful Kaiser of Germany. One of these estimates rates him as a man of great shrewdness and great ability. The other holds him to be a vain, blustering, conceited fellow who would never have amounted to anything but for the accident of being born to the purple. Just now he is credited with an ambitious scheme for German expansion eastward, in which Austro-Hungary, Turkey and Asia Minor are to be ultimately included. It is a bold program, which presupposes that Austria-Hungary will go to pieces after the death of Emperor Francis Joseph, and that the large German element within the empire-monarchy will then easily affiliate with Germany. In the meantime, as the closest friend and protector of Turkey, the Kaiser hopes to absorb the lion's share of the Sultan's possessions when the "Sick Man's" affairs are closed out.
