—DEBATING CLUB.—The last meeting of the Abram's Village Debating Club took place on Thursday evening, Nov. 4th. The attendance was fair, and the discussion interesting. As is the custom across one of the members of the club was given before the discussion began, this time by Peter Gallant. As the suggestion has been made by several members, that the debates be abandoned, and night schools be taken up instead the lecturer took for his subject the above suggestion. He pointed out to them that there was a vast difference in the mode of instruction. That while in the debates the instruction was natural, in a night school they would have to enter into the atmosphere of students. He dwelt on the feasibility of a night school, but insisted on the fact that the success of night school as has been the case with the debates, depended on themselves. He then extended his lecture on Education in general since after all, that is what they are after. A vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer. The subject for discussion was, Resolved that our present school curriculum is in the best interest of a pupil. The supporters maintained that with the present system, that is with the introduction of Agriculture, Nature Study, Drawing and Physical Drill, a pupil would be better guided towards his vocation and would become a keener observer and acquire more of a business and habits of discipline. Those in the negative said that with our short school hours, and length of time a pupil spent at school it was impossible for a teacher to give any time to many of those subjects, and that instead of them serving as a vocational guidance they were often a burden, and were interfering with the fundamental education of a pupil. A majority of one was in favor of the Resolution.—M.
