

SCHOONER EVOLUTION LIBELLED BY M. D. S.

BOSTON, Dec. 13.—The British schooner M. D. S., Capt. Richter, from Haastport, N. S., from New York, which was towed here from Gloucester several days ago seriously damaged as a result of being run into by the British schooner Evolution, which parted from her anchorage and crashed into her, is repairing the damage at Greens yard, Chelsea, and will be ready to resume her passage very soon. The cost of the repairs will amount to about \$2,000.

ACCEPTS 25,000 AND SETTLE SUITS.

LINCOLN CENTER, Dec. 13.—Miss Mary Chamberlain, the school teacher who was lured to a lonely spot and smeared with tar by several men, will probably accept \$25,000 in lieu of all claims for damages, and the affair will be dropped as far as the courts are concerned.

Following the conviction of some of the men engaged in the tarring, Miss Chamberlain contemplated bringing damage suits against all those directly involved but the men against whom these suits were to be directed have opened negotiations for a settlement. Clubwomen in Hutchison and other towns, however, are still intensely hostile to Miss Chamberlain. An effort was made at the recent conference of city clubs to take some action favorable to Miss Chamberlain, but it met with such a storm of disapproval that it was hastily dropped. The women, however, did recommend a law making the tarring of a woman a felony.
