SUCCESSFUL FESTIVAL — A very successful strawberry festival was held on the beautiful grounds at Government House yesterday in aid of the Red Cross. About 1000 people attended the affair which was sponsored by the No Tramps Bridge Club, a group of eight Charlottetown ladies. The festival lasted from four in the afternoon until nine in the evening. Pleasing music was supplied by the League of the Cross Band. The use of the grounds was kindly donated by His Honour, Lieutenant Governor B. W. LePage and Mrs. LePage.

MORE PARTICULARS — Further details have been learned about the accident at Brookfield, near Hunter River in which George William MacDonald received injuries which later proved fatal. Jack Gallant was in the front seat with the deceased while, another passenger, Bruce Chandler was in the back seat. When the car overturned MacDonald was pinned underneath. Gallant tried to extricate him but could not find that Chandler was unable to get out of the back door opened. Both boys were released their companions, William MacDonald received a tourniquet on his arm which was bleeding badly. However, the flow of blood did not stop and they went to a nearby house and a farmer hurriedly drove them to Charlottetown and the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Mr. Joseph MacDonald, father of the injured boy did not go out to the scene of the accident, as was stated, nor had he been informed of it by phone. The injured boy passed away at the hospital a few hours after the accident. A severed artery caused death by bleeding.

Repeated bombing raids on British port areas and the industrial midlands has attracted fresh attention to the frightful suffering of many thousands of civilians in Great Britain who are harried from shelter to shelter and finally driven into the open country by successive raids. Eventually places are found for them all, places of relative security, but their belongings of all kinds are destroyed. The task of emergency feeding alone is difficult. The task of setting them up once more with some quantity of clothing and bedding is much more difficult.

To meet these enormous needs, funds have been started in various parts of the world. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth has permitted the use of her name in connection with the Dominion campaign, which is

officially known as "The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims."
