AMHERST HORSE THIEF CAUGHT

DORCHESTER, N. B., Oct. 23.—Jailer J. Holland and Constable Fred Cook, of this place effected the clever capture of an Amherst horse thief near Calhoun's Mills at noon today. The prisoner gives the name of William Theriault, and it appears that he hired a horse and carriage from John Cody, of Amherst. He passed through Dorchester early this morning, and tried to sell the animal and rig to Mr. Albert Card at an amazingly small figure. The horse was recognized as one formerly owned in Dorchester. Suspicions were aroused that the animal was stolen. These suspicions proved correct. A telephone message from Amherst requested Jailer Holland to arrest the man and care for the horse. Mr. Holland and Fred Cook at once left Dorchester in W. F. Tait's automobile. The man was arrested, as stated, and is now locked up in Dorchester jail, awaiting the arrival of Chief of Police Carter from Amherst. The prisoner offered no resistance and refuses to talk, only to say that he was going to Barachois, near Shediac.

PICTOU BOAT.—The S. S. Northumberland arrived at 8.05 last evening.

LAST DAY OF BARGAINS.—The special ten days sale of Narda lamps conducted by the Charlottetown Light and Power Company closes tonight. The exchange of Carbon lamps has been quite a success the sales averaging about 100 per day. 2307.

THE BOSTON BOAT.—The S. S. A. W. Perry arrived in Charlottetown yesterday morning at 11 o'clock with passengers and an exceptionally large cargo. She sailed again at 9 o'clock last evening with another large cargo consisting chiefly of 1000 barrels of mackerel, 400 cases of lobsters, 500 bags of potatoes, 200 bags of turnips, etc.

EARL GREY.—The C. G. S. Earl Grey was towed from her regular berth at the Marine wharf, Charlottetown, to the Railway wharf on Thursday evening, to allow Dredge No. 9 of the Department of Public Works, to dredge the west side of the Marine wharf. The ice breaker will likely be taken out in the stream today to make room for the large oil barge of the Standard Oil Company, which will shortly arrive from New York.

JETTISON.—A sequel to the recent stranding of the Norwegian steamer Bjorgvin on the Indian Rocks at Wood Islands on the southeast coast of the Island takes place shortly in the sale of a large quantity of the lumber which the steamer was carrying as deck cargo at the time she ran upon the reef in question. In order to lighten her so as to get the Bjorgvin afloat again this portion of the cargo had to be jettisoned, and it now lies scattered along the shore over a distance of about nine miles, where it has been washed in by the waves. This lumber consists of three inch spruce deal, and there is altogether about 250,000 cu ft of it to be sold at auction; of these about 100,000 cu ft. lies on the breakwater, at Belle river and a like quantity on Wood Islands breakwater, with the remainder about the high water mark along the shore. At highwater there is eight feet of water at Belle river and ten feet at Wood Islands making it thus an easy matter to load the lumber into schooners at these points.

DESERVES ENCOURAGEMENT.—During the past summer, notwithstanding the well known scarcity of lobsters the aggregate output of canned lobsters in Canada exceeded by several thousand dollars the output of the previous year. This is attributed to the fact that the fishermen were better equipped this year than ever before. The improved equipment consisted largely of a gasoline motor in practically every lobster boat employed in the fisheries during the summer, enabling them to haul their traps, in almost regardless of weather conditions, instead of as formerly, waiting for a favorable wind. To be fully equipped is the secret of success in any undertaking and the introduction of the gasoline motor is only another indication of the adjustment to conditions that is continuously going on. The fishing industry, one of the most important in Canada, had responded more slowly perhaps than any other to the rapidly changing demands of progress and, in consequence, made less rapid strides than any other. The past two summers have seen the beginning of a revolution in this industry which is destined to grow with the years. For this revolution the gasoline motor must be credited. Without it the fisheries would still be carried along on primitive lines and with increasing discouragement to those engaged in it. The placing of a reliable motor within reach of the P. E. THE MARKET'S.—The Charlottetown market was dull yesterday, owing perhaps to the fact that the farmers are taking advantage of the fine weather to complete their harvesting. Eggs sold at 25 to 28 c. per dozen, butter at 25 to 28 c. each 75 cents. There was a fair amount of produce handled, and the prices in all other cases remained the same as previously announced.
