The following letter from his Lordship Bishop O'Leary, was read on Sunday at the different Catholic Churches throughout the Province: In the spirit of true patriotism it becomes our duty to join with our fellow-citizens in celebrating worthily the Diamond Jubilee of the Confederation of the Dominion which is our beloved heritage and home. In all civic demonstrations of the rejoicing of our people we feel sure that our Catholics will be given and will take their proper place. In religious ceremonies we, according to the rules of our combined services of other denominations, but we should endeavor to express publicly to God our sincere thanks and gratitude to Him for the many graces and blessings He has showered upon our country during the past and earnestly beg of Him to bless and protect us in the future.

We shall, therefore, take our part in the National Thanksgiving services to be held at 2.30 o'clock on Sunday, July 3rd by having at that hour, wherever possible by the Pastors, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament followed by the singing, where feasible, or at least the recitation of the "Te Deum" our patriotic hymn of Thanksgiving. We would further request the Reverend Pastors that they, at the hour or, if more convenient, at the Parish Mass on Sunday, to dress their congregations exhorting them to sentiments of true love of country, the exercise of supernaturalized civic virtue, thanksgiving for past benefits, and prayers for the future peace and welfare of our country.

In our Cathedral parish we shall have a Solemn High Mass with appropriate sermon on Sunday morning and Benediction with "Te Deum" at 2.30 p. m.

ANGUS M'PHEE BURIED TODAY AT THE AGE OF 100

Having passed by four months, the century milestone of his life, Angus McPhee, who died on Wednesday was buried this afternoon at Norton. Services were conducted in the Sacred Heart Church there.

Mr. McPhee had for several years made his home alternately with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. James H. Sheenan, Park avenue, East Saint John and in Norton with Mr. and Mrs. Ora E. Yerxa, also son-in-law and daughter.

Mr. McPhee was born in the environs of Georgetown, P.E.I. in 1827. Throughout his active life he had never, until his final illness suffered a day of real sickness. Returning to Norton after a visit to Mr. and Mrs. Sheenan, he never again, three months ago he was in quite a feeble condition and had been confined to his bed practically ever since. He was a staunch upholder of temperance throughout his life.

WAS TAILOR

Mr. McPhee removed from Prince Edward Island to New Brunswick in 1853. The earlier days of his life he spent as a journeyman tailor, making long trips about the province from village to village and town to town, plying his industry on needle for a living. He was one of the number who helped run the first chain when the first sod was turned for what is now the C.N.R., when construction was begun from Saint John to Shediac. He had lived in the reign of five British sovereigns—George IV, William IV, Queen Victoria, Edward VII and George V.

HIS DESCENDANTS

Mr. McPhee was married after coming to New Brunswick. His first wife was Miss Carney, of Bloomfield, Kings County, after the death of whom he married Miss Ellen Duffy, also of Kings county. She died more than 40 years ago. He is survived by four daughters—Mrs. Ora E. Yerxa, Norton; Mrs. James H. Sheenan, East Saint John; Mrs. Allister MacDonnell, Georgetown, P.E.I.; Mrs. Norman McCabe, Bath, Me.; and two sons—William McPhee, of Saint John, and Rudolph McPhee, in the west. The late Rev. R. P. McPhee, Catholic priest of Rustico, P.E.I., was a brother. A sister is living in Prince Edward Island, more than 90 years of age. Besides a large number of grandchildren, he is survived by three great-grandchildren and Rudolph McPhee, one of those named but often of equal importance, are the following: Tutted vetch, curled dock, shepherd's purse, sheep sorrel, lamb's quarters, common plantain, common mouse-ear chickweed, mouse-ear hawkweed (sometimes called lent), hawkweed (locally), perennial sow thistle, burdock, tansy ragwort (stinking Willie), spurrey, wild buckwheat, king devil and others which, like wild mustard, and wild radish were not at a stage of development to be seen at their worst. Of the above weeds, several are rather characteristic of Prince Edward Island, and some other parts of Eastern Canada. Fall dandelion, mouse-ear hawkweed, ragwort and wild radish for instance, are only occasionally seen as far west as Ontario. Ox-eye daisy, buttercup, the various hawkweeds, spurrey, and utric vetch, while by no means uncommon are not the conspicuous weeds there that are almost everywhere eastward. This may be variously explained, but undoubtedly a principal factor is the prevailing cropping practice in Quebec and the Maritime provinces, which leaves a large proportion of the land permanently or for long periods under hay and pasture. Any change in the farm economy which will make possible the use of shorter rotational crops, including more cleaning crops, may be counted on to suppress this type of weed. The increasing prominence of the potato crop is now contributing to this end.

A Weed Survey of Prince Edward Island

In Scientific Agriculture for June, Herbert Groh, of the Division of Botany, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, Ontario contributes an article of interest to P.E.I. readers, giving as it does, the results of a weed survey of the province which was carried out last midsummer. During the two weeks spent on the island, observations were made in 35 of the 74 lots and towns, no great area anywhere being left unvisited. The time was much too short for really exhaustive inspections, but the results taken all together are believed to give a very fair idea, not only of the species of weeds occurring, but also of their relative abundance in the province.

The definition of a weed for the purpose of the survey is made quite broad to include besides plants like the thistles, mustards, etc., universally regarded as noxious, many others which may be troublesome in various manners and degrees, and even aggressive, escapes from cultivation which are only weeds when out of their proper places. No less than 162 of these plants are aliens which have been introduced to the country at some time in the past and this number includes a large proportion of the most aggressive weeds. Of the remainder which are native, quite a number are included by reason of their poisonous properties alone, and may or may not be seen on farm land. These poisonous plants number 47, all told among the most important of them being bracken, the horsetails, sheep laurel ragwort and water hemlock.


