**Six Parties Offering
 In U. S. Election**

 WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (CP)—Little is heard of any but the Democrats and Republicans in the United States' Presidential race but there are six national tickets offering candidates for top honors in next Tuesday's voting.
 The Democratic candidates, President Roosevelt and Senator Harry Truman of Missouri, and the Republicans Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Gov. John Bricker of Ohio, will have their electors' names on every state ballot.
 But four minor-party organizations plan to have presidential and vice-presidential electors listed on many state ballots or provision for them to be written in.
 These are:
 The Prohibition Party (which leads all other minor parties in number of candidates), with Dr. Claude A. Watson of Los Angeles and Andrew Johnson of Wilmore, Kentucky, as candidates for president and vice president.
 The Socialist Party with its perennial candidate, Norman Thomas New York, and Darlington Hoopes, Reading, Pa., heading the ticket.
 The Socialist-Labor Party with Edward A. Teichert, Greensburg, Pa., and Aris A. Albaugh, Massillon, Ohio, as candidates.
 The American First Party with Rev. Gerald L.K. Smith of Detroit and Harry Roman, St. Henry, Ohio, seeking the highest offices.
 Probably the activities of these groups mean little to the ultimate result. There were seven minor parties in the 1940 presidential race and they polled a total of 267,000 votes in about 50,000,000.
 The Prohibition Party has a total of 72 candidates, presidential and congressional, and has its electors' names on the ballots of 26 states.
 Next in line, the Socialists have 56 candidates with presidential electors on the ballots of 25 states, a smaller number than it had planned to enter.
 The Socialist-Labor group has only 20 candidates but will have presidential electors on 15 state ballots.
 The American firsters have electors on only two state ballots but hope to have them written in on many other state voting forms.
 There are a number of other scattered, miscellaneous party tags represented in the congressional nominations, including "Victory without hate," "Preserve American Independence," "Fellowship" and "Industrial Government."

**Germans Quit
 Salonika**

ROME, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Allied command announced today that advance British patrols had reached Salonika, Greece's second city and the principal seaport of the Balkan Peninsula, and Berlin said that German forces had evacuated the port.
 Salonika, which had a pre-war population of 240,000, is situated at the northwest corner of the Aegean Sea and is within 50 miles of the southern borders of Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. In 1925 the Greeks made its sheltered harbor a "free zone" for the use of the other Balkan nations. Goods from the other Balkan nations were shipped to the port by the trunk railway that runs through the Vardar and Morava valleys south from Belgrade.
 German troops who captured the city April 9, 1941, made up the seventh invading army to tread its streets since it was founded in 315 B. C. The population is mixed, 90 per cent Greek and the rest Turks, Jews, Bulgarians, Serbs, Italians and Frenchmen.

**Edmonton Pilot
 Has Big Score**

WITH THE R. C. A. F. SOMEWHERE IN EUROPE, Nov. 1 (CP Cable)—Pit-Lt. Don Laubman, young Edmonton Spitfire pilot, became the highest scoring fighter R.C.A.F. pilot in operations since D-Day with the announcement today that he downed two FW190's during one recent sortie over Holland.
 The double kill, made during the concluding sortie of his operational tour, raised his score to 18 enemy planes destroyed and three damaged since June 6, when the invasion of western France began.
 Laubman, recently awarded a bar to his D.F.C., made his latest scores near Coesfeld in Holland when he chased two enemy aircraft after leading his flight in an attack on a railway yard, the first plane crashed and the second also crashed after the pilot jumped out.

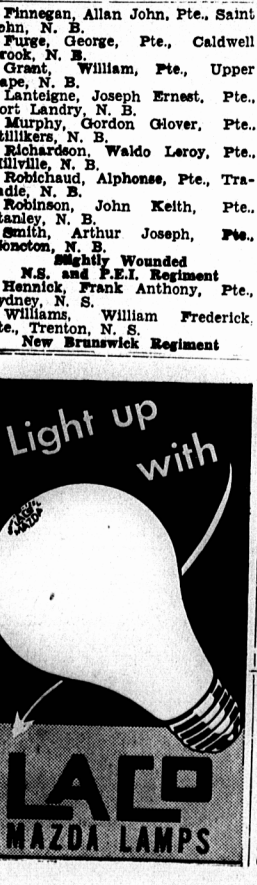
