FRANCE STILL IN THE GRIP OF WINTER

From Every Point of The Compass Unfavorable Reports are Coming in -- Crops Ruined in Many Districts.

PARIS, May 5.—France still remains in the grip of winter, notwithstanding that Lillies of the Valley made their appearance on May Day.

From every point of the compass reports are coming in to the effect that districts have been affected by high winds and floods and even snow, and that continuous rains have caused floods in many sections of the country.

Crops Are Ruined. Not since 1894 have there been such widespread floods at a time when so much damage to agriculture is bound to result.
