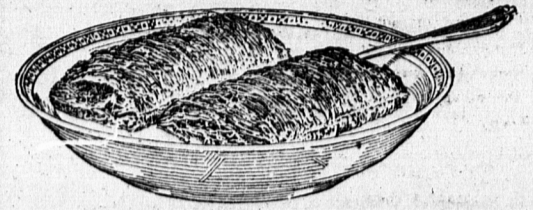

GLEN VALLEY SCHOOL.

The semi-annual examination of Glen Valley School was held on Friday, June 30th, in the presence of a large number of parents and ratepayers. The pupils, who were examined by their teacher, Miss Mary M. Muttart, assisted by her sister, Miss A. Lora Muttart, by their prompt and intelligent answers showed that they had been carefully instructed during the past year. Public School Certificates from the Department of Education were presented to Doris Abbott and Wilfred Nicholson after which Mr. Malcolm Gillis was called to the chair. A well rendered program consisting of songs, recitations and dialogues, was carried out by the pupils. After treating the visitors and pupils with candy a splendid address was read by Doris Abbott, while Katherine Gillis presented Miss Muttart with a beautiful camera.

Miss Muttart, though by surprise in a few well chosen words, expressed her appreciation of their thoughtfulness and extended her sincere thanks to the pupils and the people of the district. Remarks were made by the Chairman and others and the meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.

THE COMMON DRINKING TROUGH

Several lessons may be drawn from a particularly unfortunate incident which recently came to our attention. A dairy farmer wished to have an accredited herd and signed up to have his animals tested with that object in view.

The first test showed a few reactors, which were disposed of at once. The second test showed a few suspicious cases and the third test made last September was clean.

Early in the winter this dairy farmer bought a bull and five cows with health certificates showing they had been tested and passed for tuberculosis. These animals were placed in the herd and all were housed in a barn with a low ceiling but fairly well ventilated. The mangers were used for watering troughs, the practice being to sweep them before watering and then allow the water to run into one end, from whence it ran the full length of the manger.

In March, when the fourth test fell due, 75 per cent of the entire herd proved to be positive reactors. This number included the bull and some of the females bought early in the winter. The conclusion to be drawn from such evidence is that the animals bought in the fall brought in the disease and that through the use of a common drinking trough its spread was greatly facilitated. It would also seem that the natural resistance to disease of the herd was very low.

From the foregoing conclusion it is evident that a rest is necessary in all cases before new animals are added to a clean herd. We do not have the facts concerning how the animals sold were tested, but even though no fraud was intended, the buyer took a
