M. WITTE.

M. Witte won his fight because he had behind him a government that said what it meant and meant what it said. When it stood out against the payment of an indemnity and the surrender of all Sakhalin it stood for principles which it was determined to maintain without regard to consequences. But there can be no doubt that the resource, resolution, character and capacity of the envoy were in themselves the leading factors in enabling the Russian Government to pursue a steadfast policy. To Sergius Witte must accrue the chief credit for the extraordinary triumph won by a beaten nation. He has not been popular with those who control affairs in Russia. His selection for the delicate task at Portsmouth is said to have been due to the personal preference of the Czar as opposed to the preference of the Czar's advisers. M. Witte was driven to resign from the ministry of finance by the same influences that balked at his appointment as envoy. To those influences he was and is obnoxious as a Liberal who believes that the only way to deal with the always present internal crisis in Russia is to grant a generous measure of self-government to the people. He has stood for that belief with the same tenacity that marked his opposition to the payment of an indemnity. For so doing he has been traduced, ridiculed, thwarted and disgraced. But his hour of triumph has at last arrived. He returns to Russia as the man who negotiated a treaty saving the honor and dignity of his fatherland. Much will be given to him. Much may be rightfully demanded by him. He is the one man to whom the Liberal sentiment of the empire may look for leadership and for progress—Brooklyn Eagle.

In the joy of not having to pay the bill, Russia is prepared to forget the trifling facts that her armies suffered defeats and her navy is at the bottom of the sea.

He was giving at the county fair an exhibition of the use of dynamite from a balloon for war purposes. He had three sticks of the explosive with him. When he had reached a height of 2,000 feet the dynamite accidentally exploded and the balloon and man were literally torn to pieces.

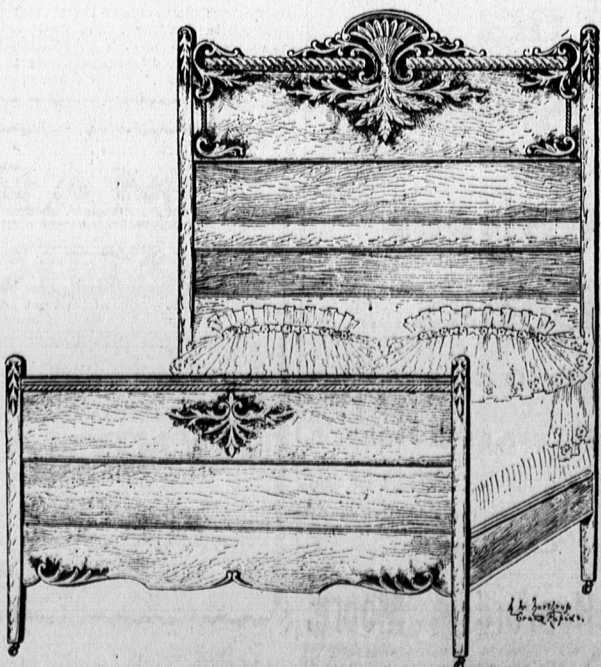
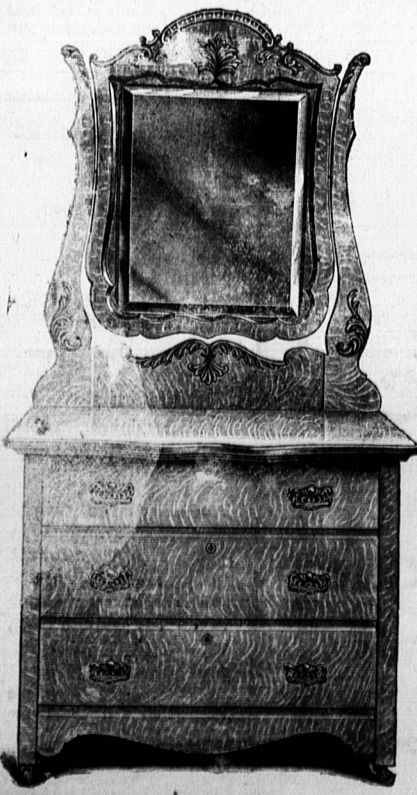
