TEN YEARS FOR WINDSOR, ONT., DYNAMITER.

WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 15.—If I am to be convicted on this crime, I am going down as an innocent man. This man—pointing his finger above—“knows I am innocent of wrongdoing. I never was in sympathy with the Germans and never shall be while I am on earth.”

This was the fervent declaration of William Lefter, who was Friday morning sentenced by Judge Dromote to five years in Kingston Penitentiary of the charge of being an accomplice in the dynamite explosion which partially wrecked the Peabody plant in Walkerville on June 21, and five years on the charge of conspiracy in an attempt to blow up the Windsor Arsenal.

Both Lefter and his wife, who was present in the court room, completely broke down when court passed sentence.

Lefter appeared to be dazed and with tears streaming down his face he protested his innocence, while Mrs Lefter exclaimed in a voice almost drowned by sobs: “My God, I’ll be dead before he is let out.”

### IN MEMORIAM

MICHAEL PAUL.

Michael Paul, the well known Indian runner died early Sunday morning and his death is lamented by the whole Miamae population as well as by many white friends. Michael was one of the most intelligent of the Indian Indians and had a good education. A few years ago he was one of the leading athletes of the Province and was a member of the Abegweit track team at a number of important meets. He has been sick for some months and has had the greatest care and attention at the hands of his wife Julia and Alice Mitchell with whom they lived. For the feast of St. Anne at the first of this month he went up to Lennox Island and his friends thought then that he might live for some months. The funeral takes place this morning.

### DEATH OF MR. M. MULLIGAN.

At Middleton on Friday, July 30th, there passed from this life Mr. Martin Mulligan, at the age of sixty years. The deceased, who was well known, was one of the most respected residents of that district, he having lived his entire life in that vicinity. Although he had been in ill-health for some months, throughout his illness he was tenderly cared for and all that medical skill could do was done, but nothing could retard the grim messenger of death. During his illness the consolations of his holy religion were administered by Rev. Father McIntyre and his worthy pastor Rev. J. J. McDonald. Besides his sorrowing wife he leaves to mourn their loss five daughters, Mrs. J. A. Burnett, of Boston, Mass.; Mrs. Leo Hughes, of Kensington; Mary, Katie and Marion at home; also five sons, John, of Kinross; Ernest Martin, Harold and Elmer at home. On Sunday morning, Aug. 1st, at nine o'clock, his funeral, which was very largely attended, moved slowly to the Roman Catholic Church, where the funeral services were conducted by Rev. Father McIntyre and his remains were conveyed to their last resting place in St. Malachias Cemetery to "Sleep in peace." The pall bearers were Messrs. James Johnson, John Johnson, Jerome Smith, Thomas McCarville, Thomas Campbell and Hugh Campbell.

### ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION

On Sunday, Aug. 6th, Rev. Maurice McDonald, who has been pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, Alberton, preached his farewell sermon prior to his departure for Charlottetown where he will be rector of St. Dunstan's Cathedral.

During his short pastorate in Alberton, Father Maurice has so endeared himself to his congregation that his early and unexpected departure was deeply regretted by all. To show how much his work was appreciated it is sufficient to refer to the fact that he was presented with an address accompanied by a purse containing \$150. The address was read by Mr. Leo Nelligan, while Mr. William Keefe made the presentation. In replying to the address, Father Maurice, expressed deep regret at his transference and referred to the amicable relations which always existed between himself and the congregation. He thanked them warmly for the many kindnesses shown him, and emphasised very strongly the fact that in all his attempts to effect improvements and to ameliorate conditions he received the heartiest support of the people. He exhorted them to continue the good work under the new pastor, Rev. Dr. Campbell, whom he spoke of in terms of the highest praise.

Following is the address:—  
To Rev. Maurice McDonald,  
Rev. and Dear Father:

On the eve of your departure from amongst us, we feel it a duty incumbent upon us to show in some tangible way our deep appreciation of the work that you have done in this parish during the short time that you have been pastor. It was with a great deal of regret that we heard that you were to be transferred to Charlottetown and the only thing that reconciles us to your departure, is that Charlottetown will be a larger field wherein to do the Master's work and that your usefulness will be greatly augmented. We therefore feel

that our loss will be another gain. Looking back over the past two years we see them replete with improvements and reforms which were brought about through your instrumentality. When you took charge of the parish you found the Church was in the vicinity of \$1200. Now we are glad to say it is completely cleared off. For this we certainly owe you a great debt of gratitude. We have always found you ready and willing at all times to attend to our spiritual wants. The lateness of the hour or your own physical condition were matters of secondary consideration when you were asked to minister to a dying person, to hear a confession or to perform some other spiritual work.

When you were called upon to address a public meeting as you have been at the many patriotic meetings during the past year the manner in which you acquitted yourself was always to us a source of justifiable pride. In the pulpit your lucid explanations of the articles of our faith, your strong appeals and the ever-present tone of sincerity could not but carry conviction. We might mention many other good qualities which you manifested and enumerate many other improvements which you have effected, but we fear it will detract from the value to eulogize that which does not seek eulogy. Although we must express our appreciation we refrain from praise because we know that the motive which prompted these good works was not a desire for publicity and emolument but a fidelity to the manifold duties incumbent upon your high and sacred office.

Now dear Father Maurice as tangible evidence of our esteem for you and to furnish something to remind you of your brief but successful pastorate in Alberton we should ask you to accept this purse. We hope that

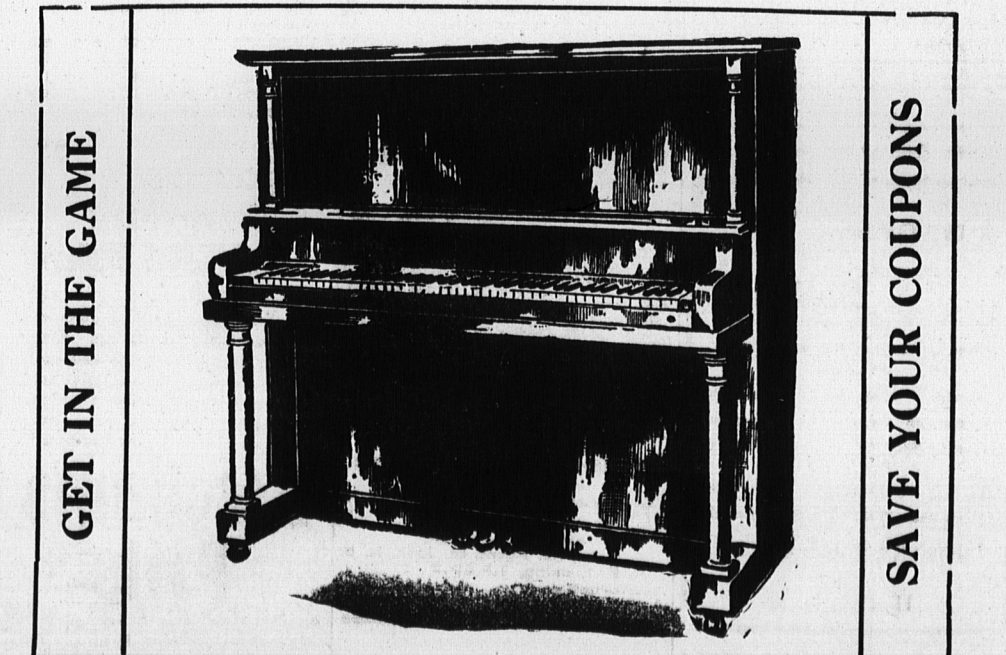
