United States Captures Doubles Match

Winners Handed Tough Opposition From British Duo

Stoefen Vindicates Himself, Playing Brilliant Tennis In Fourth Set When Losers Looked As If They Might Beat Favorites.

(C.P.-AP. By Guardian's Special Wire)
WIMBLEDON, July 30.—Great Britain tonight required only one victory in tomorrow's singles matches with the United States to make sure of retaining the Davis Cup, historic tennis trophy.

As was expected, the United States' team of George M. Lott, Jr., and Lester Stoefen defeated George Patrick Hughes and Harold George Newcombe 7-5, 6-0, 4-6, 9-7 in the doubles today. Britain won both the opening singles matches Saturday.

Fred Perry, the world's top-ranking player, meets Francis X. Shields in one of the final singles while Henry W. (Bunny) Austin and Sidney B. Wood, Jr., engage in the other. Perry is expected to defeat Shields without difficulty.

The doubles match was far closer than the score indicates. The veteran British team put up a stubborn argument against their favored rivals and forced them to a burning finish. The Americans appeared to be stirring badly in the third set and played raggedly.

Stoefen in Form
Incidentally, the match proved a vindication for Stoefen. The six-foot five-inch Californian, whose career play caused Capt. R. Norris (Dick) Williams to send a hurry call to the United States for Wilmer Allison and nearly cost him his place on the squad, finished today's battle as a blaze of shotmaking.

In what proved to be the final game in the fourth set with Hughes serving both Americans seemed to be so tired they scarcely could hit the ball while the Britons were getting stronger by the minute. It appeared they would be licked if the match went to the fifth set for conclusion.

Four straight times Lott, the veteran "premier" doubles player in the world, returned Hughes' serves outside the court. Each time Stoefen rectified the lapse with a brilliant placement. Finally Lott managed to get the ball back into play and Lester closed the match with a winner into the back alley.

Opened Quietly
The match opened quietly enough with Stoefen somewhat erratic and unable to get the first ball of his service in the court. Lott was pulled out the first set at 7-5, Lester rallying in the crucial 10th game to win his service with two burning aces.

It began to look like a rout as the Americans simply overwhelmed Ferris and Lee, substituted for Perry at the last minute to save the latter for singles duty, to take the second set 6-0 and the first two games of the third.

The Britons rallied there to storm the net together as Lott became untidy, break George and then Stoefen twice and take the set 6-4. They again rallied, after again dropping the first two games, to make the final set a battle but they could not match the blazing finish of the blonde from California and went down after a surprising stand. The Americans were considered overwhelming favorites even with Perry playing.

NEW YORK, July 30.—Wesley Ferrell subdued the hapless Sen-ators at Washington today, shut-ting them out with 10 hits while Boston's Red Sox hammered Linke around and took the final game of the series 8-0.
Boston captured the three-game set, 2-1 and gave the crippled Washington club its 20th defeat during July against eight victories. The loss dropped the Senators to sixth place again as St. Louis Browns defeated Chicago.
For Ferrell it was his ninth vic-tory of his late-starting season ag-ainst a single defeat and a fairly easy task despite Washington's ten blows. With Heinie Manush, Johnny Stone and Joe Kuhel on the injured list, the Senators ag-ain presented a makeshift lineup. Rookie Johnny Gill played left field in place of Manush, who got in only as a pinch hitter. Red Kress was shifted to right and catcher Luke Sewell played first base, the berth Kress has been holding down since Kuhel broke his leg. Cliff Bolton, who only de-ferred the holdout ranks a few days ago, caught.

Browns Win In Ninth
The Browns rallied behind Dick Coffman's good pitching at St. Louis, tied Chicago White Sox in the eighth and won 4-3 in the ninth.
Sammy West was the batting hero of the day, his homer in the eighth, with a mate on base, tying the score at three all. West also scored another run for the Browns in the sixth, after singling.

CANADIANS IN TRAINING OVERSEAS

LONDON, July 30.—Canada's big British Empire Games team, the largest body of athletes to journey overseas for the second Empire festival, went into intensive train-ing in the London district today. The Canadians apparently had suc-cessfully rid themselves of their sea-legs since arriving Saturday.

M. M. Robinson, Manager of the team, said there were no accidents to mar the crossing from Montreal to Liverpool. He told British sports authorities that Canada's girl track team was regarded as outstanding in virtually every event and when the sprinters, hurdlers and jumpers started working out observers agreed they would be hard to beat.

But it remained for a girl diver, 13 year old Lynda Adams of Van-couver, to create a real sensation. A large crowd that watched the swimming and diving squad practice in a London pool raved over Lynda's magnificent display from the springboard. The Vancouver girl was said to be even better from the tower.

The swimming team was enter-tained by the Hastings Swimmers' Club and following a luncheon gave an exhibition of speed swimming. The track and field, boxing and wrestling forces were entertained at a tea at Wilton Court. Tomorrow all teams, including the Canadian, will be entertained by the Prince of Wales at St. James Palace.

Observers had little opportunity to size up the strength of the Canadian trackmen. The first group to show real form was the quarter-mile set by four. Ray Lewis of Hamilton, Bill Fritz and Art Scott of Windsor, Ont., and John Addison of Victoria, Lewis, who won the Canadian trial in 48.9 sec-onds was likely to start as joint favorite in this event with Godfrey Rampling of England.

Preparations were near comple-tion for the grand opening of the games on Saturday afternoon at White City Stadium. More than 500 athletes from all parts of the Empire will parade around the track and line up in front of the stands for the official opening cere-monies.

The Canadian team of nearly 100 athletes and officials will lead the colorful parade.
