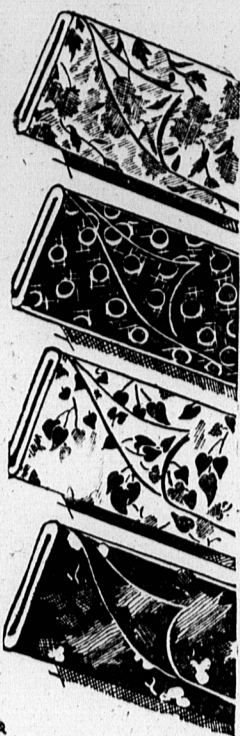

### SUMMERSIDE CURLING

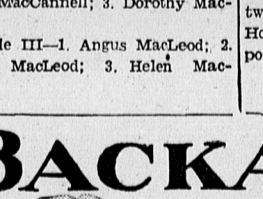
Curling at the Summerside rink is in full swing. The rinks competing for the Club championship are playing every evening. More interest is being shown in the game this year, and some close scores have been made.

The Thursday afternoon Bridge club was entertained by Mrs. McCready at her cosy home, Longworth Avenue.

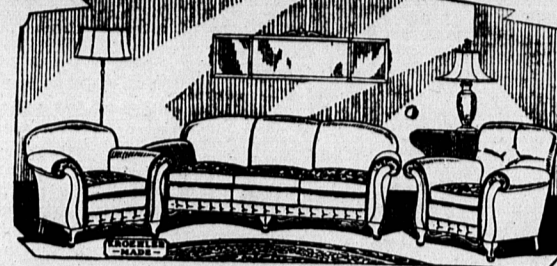

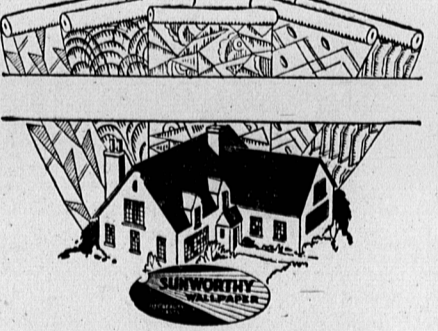
ity of their parents to undertake the financial burden of board and other expenses in Charlottetown.

It partakes of injustice that deserving youth should be deprived of advantages which should exist in our own community. Now is the time to effect a partial remedy at least, by establishing County High Schools with a Provincial Normal School in Charlottetown. Such a decision would be a distinct forward move, educationally, and would enable Prince Edward Island to develop in far greater measure than ever in the past that which is in the last analysis our greatest asset—the intellect of our youth.

In no other province, so far as I am aware, does a similar condition exist. Boys and girls need not leave their homes in the early teen years in order to obtain a high school training and matriculate to the Universities. Here, just at the time when the home influence is most needed, we must let them go to fend for themselves in Charlottetown.

I understand that the Dominion Government will assist Provinces in the erection of Public Buildings as an aid to unemployment. The time is opportune to plan for the improvement of our educational system in Prince Edward Island and to provide for the greatest good to the greatest number, to cultivate our most valuable asset and to demonstrate the progressive spirit of our Province.
