C. A. H. A. Rejects Offer Of National Hockey League; Meetings Close

VANCOUVER, May 5 (AP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association wound up its 29th annual convention here early Sunday morning with the decision to reject the National Hockey League offer of a \$20,000 yearly payment to cover all amateur players turning professional.

A three-hour session lasted well past midnight, the C.A.H.A. voting to send a five-man committee to meet with the N.H.L. board of governors in June to advise them their proposition was not acceptable and to negotiate a more attractive final with three straight triumphs.

The committee will comprise the same five who met the N.H.L. representatives in the night end of the decision, "C.A.H.A. president Hanson, Dorell, Middleton, N.S., I.H.A. president Dr. George Hardy, Edmonton, secretary George Dudley, Midland, Ont., vice-president A.L. Pickard, Regina, and Frank Sargent, past president, Fort Arthur.

The vote favoring the resolution was 18 to 6 with the opposition led by George Hunter of Gravenhurst, Ont., president of the O.H.A. He felt the C.A.H.A. should stand behind its demand of \$2,000 for each player moving up to the N.H.L. and \$1,000 for any player moving into one of the minor pro leagues.

Dr. Hardy explained that the C.A.H.A. was at a disadvantage in attempting to press its demands. There was talk of signing all amateur players to contracts but he was not so sure the contracts would be valid.

CHURCHILL DOWNS, Louisville, Ky., May 5 (AP)—Assault, a chip-off-the-old-block from the wide open spaces of Texas, struck lightning on the stretch of Churchill Downs Saturday to win the Kentucky Derby like his daddy did — and the greatest crowd in American racing history saw him do it.

Coming from behind, the lanky Assault found a hole to slip through at the head of the quarter mile stretch of heart-break highway. He then came home swinging on the bit, by eight lengths, the first Texas-bred-and-born-and-owned three-year-old ever to win the "Run for the Roses."

And as he hit the wire far in front of the sagging Spy Song, the hundreds of Texas fans throng — estimated by Colonel Matt Winn, Derby impresario, as "easily over 100,000" — let out a squee-yy-yay-yay.
