

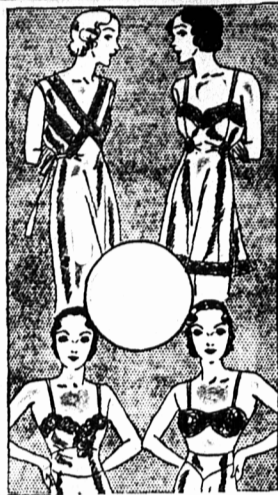

—DEATH BY NATURAL CAUSES—The adjourned inquest to enquire into the death of Ernest Clow (Jr.) of Summerside who passed away on Sunday night on board the schooner A. S. Moulton, when she was 85 miles from land, was resumed at Compton's undertaking parlours on Tuesday afternoon before Dr. E. T. Tanton, coroner. Dr. J. A. McPhee, who had made an autopsy of the body the night before, gave evidence that he had gone out to the vessel, which was seven miles off the shore at Seaview, in company with Mr. Thane A. Campbell, K. C., of Summerside, and that they had found everything in order. The captain told him how the deceased had been taken suddenly ill on Sunday morning and had passed away shortly before 10 o'clock Sunday night. They were then 85 miles from shore. They came within the three mile limit and flew their flag at half mast. Dr. McPhee took the body ashore to the Darnley side of Malpeque Bay, where an inquest was held. Dr. McPhee stated that upon examination he found that the deceased had evidently suffered from severe gastritis followed by peritonitis. He also stated that he had attended the deceased in March for the same trouble. Mr. Clovis Perry gave evidence that he had been hailed by the Captain of

the schooner and asked to notify the authorities that Ernest Clow had died aboard their vessel. The jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes in accordance with the doctor's evidence. S.

—A BUSY PORT—Jude's Point, Tignish, is a scene of activity at this time of the year, lobster fishing has been very successful this season and wonderful catches have been reported there. The lovely up to date and convenient packing factory owned and operated by the Tignish Fish-eries Ltd., is now in full swing and being kept very busy. There are 85 fishermen all well equipped for this work who land a great many lobsters, the largest of which are canned by a staff of 38 girls and nearly as many men. This work is all done by the most up to date methods known. The factory is equipped by steam boilers and rollers, running hot and cold water and all means of sanitation is used to turn out a product of the very highest quality which is eagerly sought by purchasers. Mr. L. J. McCarthy who has had many years experience supervises the work and his methods have proven highly successful.—T
