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Women Confused By Floral Scent In Perfume Test

WASHINGTON, April 21—(AP)—Can a woman tell an expensive perfume from an inexpensive one just by smelling it?

Can the love of your life identify such common floral odors as rose, carnation, lilac and gardenia without peeking at the label?

A couple of male psychologists, nosing into such questions scientifically, have come up with evidence that at least a group of female college students taking advanced psychology weren't too nifty with the sniffer.

Testing 69 such students—whose age ranged from 19 to 50 and who had been using perfume anywhere from one to 25 years—the pros came up with such conclusions as these:

1. The ability to recognize the difference between perfume compounds of different cost "was only slightly better than chance, with the mean percentage of correct responses being 55 (per cent).

2. What's more, the gals as a group had a smelling average of less than 25 per cent accuracy when it came to identifying eight common floral odors.

Only 17 of the 69 subjects knew a rose odor when they whiffed it—and among those who muffed the test, guesses ranged from "cold cream" to "lemon verbena."

Sharp On Pine

Only one of them could tell jangle when she smelled it—and they all drew a blank on geranium. They were sharpest on spotting the odor of pine.

"While it is somewhat surprising that so much difficulty was evidenced in identifying the various odors," declared psychologists Bernard Locke and Charles H. Grimm of Brooklyn, "it is particularly interesting that the rose, which is so common and popular to our culture, caused so much difficulty in recognition with only one out of every four subjects being able to identify it correctly."

Concerning these and other findings of their smelling test, the psychologists said in an article in the Journal of Applied Psychology: "The results obtained are not intended to indicate universal trends, since a select group was used, but they do point to the need for further investigation in this area."

At another point they remarked: "In the light of the fact that many millions of dollars are spent annually in the purchase of aromatic products it is extremely surprising that so little work has been done in any systematic fashion to evaluate some of the factors which
