Trent had his own library of 200 dictionaries and complete lists of all words with from three to 12 letters. He was equally at home with cryptograms, anagrams, charades, crosswords, word golf, word scrambles, monograms and "bl-syllabla, epigrammatic, enigmatic and phonetic charades."

LONDON, July 30—(CP)—Details of a scheme to perpetuate the memory of Rudyard Kipling have been disclosed by Lord Athlone, estimated cost being \$1,250,000.

The chief object is to build and equip a Kipling library at the Imperial Service College, Windsor, and to provide a capital sum, the income from which will be devoted to the provision of bursaries at the Imperial Service College for 50 boys.

Canada May Widen Grounds For Divorce

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, July 30—Extension of the grounds for divorce in Great Britain has raised the question as to whether similar action might be taken in Canada.

Yesterday at Winnipeg Senator Lendrum McMeans, member of the Senate Divorce Committee, asserted divorce laws should be broadened and support for the British Divorce Bill was voiced here by Senator Cairine Wilson while the bill was before the Commons at Westminster.

The bill which went through final stages of the British House a few days ago includes dejection, cruelty and insanity as grounds for dissolution of marriage. Canada has always adhered to the old tradition of British law that adultery is the only basis for divorce.

The British North America Act enumerates "marriage and divorce" among the subjects in section 91 over which the Dominion has jurisdiction and for many years after Confederation nearly all applications for divorce came before the Parliament of Canada in the form of petitions for relief.

Under section 129, however, it was provided that laws already in effect in provinces, joining the union were to be preserved. Nova Scotia and New Brunswick had passed divorce legislation prior to Confederation.

In the opinion of constitutional lawyers here, a relaxation of divorce laws would probably involve legislation by both the Dominion and the Provinces.

Divorce is increasing in Canada. For several years before the war the number was about 50 a year. In 1917 the figure was 57. The next year it was 114 and in 1919 it jumped to 376. Since then according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, there has been a gradual increase until in 1935 divorces numbered 1,526.

C. I. O. Head Uses A. F. Of L. Labor

(By The Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, July 30—United States labor circles are chuckling over the dilemma of John L. Lewis in his capacity as a private employer.

The czar of the Committee for Industrial Organization, sworn foe of the American Federation of Labor, recently bought a historic house in Alexandria, Va. It had to be renovated. The C.I.O. has not yet organized the building trades.

Investigators discovered the workmen in the Lewis home were members of the A. F. of L.

Origin Of Kilt Brings Argument

BELFAST, July 30—(CP)—Is a kilt an Irish costume? Suggestion that children wear kilts when the King and Queen visit Belfast at the end of July led to an exchange in the correspondence columns of the Belfast Telegraph on this question.

"Common Sense" opposed the idea, suggesting it would be more appropriate if the children wore typically Irish costume. Next day came support for the kilt from "Lady Student" who replied the kilt is "the national dress of Irish girls and boys."

Build Long Tunnel In Scottish Hills

GLASGOW, July 30—(CP)—A five-mile tunnel connecting Loch Garry and Loch Erich in the heart of the Grampians as part of a hydro-electric power project has been completed after two years' work.

The tunnel, about nine feet in diameter, runs beneath Mam Ban, a peak 3,000 feet high between the lochs. The intake at Loch Garry will be 32 feet below the present surface of the water. Inflow will be controlled by regulating gates, so the level of the loch can be raised or lowered as required.

Ratify Agreement Ending Strike

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 30—(CP)—Striking truck drivers tonight unanimously ratified a compromise contract reached with wholesale grocery merchants and ended the most serious phase of Buffalo's eight-day food embargo.

They agreed to go back to work early tomorrow after shelves empty of many staple foods. The ratification was voted at a strikers' mass meeting where 300 drivers heard details of the compromise and shouted in approval.

In Memoriam

MR. WILLIAM MUNN

The people of Murray River were not long since called upon to part with one of their finest residents in the person of Mr. William Munn who died at the age of 70 years.

The deceased had been in his usual fairly good condition of health until a few weeks before the coming of June and when he was taken seriously ill, all that medical skill and kind friends could do was done but all to no avail.

Mr. Munn was twice married. His first wife was Miss Emma Mobbs died in 1909 and his only child aged two years passed away some weeks later.

Besides his second wife, nee Miss Bella McIntosh, the deceased leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving brother two brothers and two sisters. The brothers are George Munn, Kansas City, and Alexander Munn, Murray River and the sisters are Mrs. Thomas Cook and Mrs. Colvin McLeod, both of Murray River. Three brothers and four sisters predeceased Mr. William Munn at different periods some years ago.

These were John Munn, Green River, Archibald Munn, Hopfield, and Malcolm Munn, Belle River, who passed away at the age of eleven years, and the sisters who predeceased their brother, William Munn, were Mrs. William Wallace, Belle River, Mrs. Ambrose Watkins, Charlottetown and two younger sisters, Misses Margaret and Isabelle Munn both of whom passed away when they were quite young.

Mr. Munn was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Munn, Belle River. When but a lad he moved with his parents to Peters Road. Later as a young man he went to Murray River and settled here and there he died.

The deceased was a man who was quite widely known and was held in high esteem by all with whom he came in contact. He ever stood ready to help out in every good cause and at the time of the disruption he remained true to the church of his fathers. He will be much missed in all of the various activities of life. His passing was one of deep peace.

The funeral which was very largely attended was conducted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert. After a short service at the house the main service was held in the Baptist Church, Murray River. The service was a very impressive one throughout. The pallbearers were Messrs George Lowe, Wm. Porter, Wm. Howe, Fred Brehaut, Frank Horton and John Ferguson.

Interment was in the Murray River Cemetery.

MR. ALEXANDER MACKENZIE

It is with deep regret that we report the death at Victoria West of Mr. Alexander MacKenzie who passed away on the 17th inst., at the ripe age of eighty-eight years.

Mr. MacKenzie was born at Rose Valley, but removed at the age of twenty-two years to the farm on which he has since resided. His passing removed a man of unusual influence and strength of character.
