Peppermint Candy Ice Cream

1 cup crushed peppermint candy

1-2 cups thin cream

1 cup whipped cream

1-8 teaspoon salt

Method: Crush the candy very fine and pour the cream over it. Set aside until the candy is dissolved or heat it slightly to hurry this along.

Cool this and then turn into a tray of the refrigerator and freeze until firm. Turn into a bowl and beat with an egg beater until light... but don't over beat the frozen mixture in any of these.

Add the salt to the cream and whip it until it holds its shape. Then fold into the first part. Return to the refrigerator and freeze as rapidly as possible until firm, then reset the cold control and hold until ready to serve.

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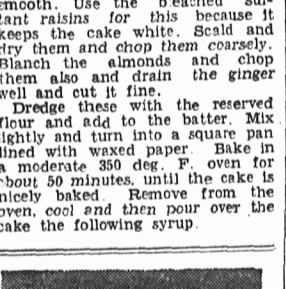

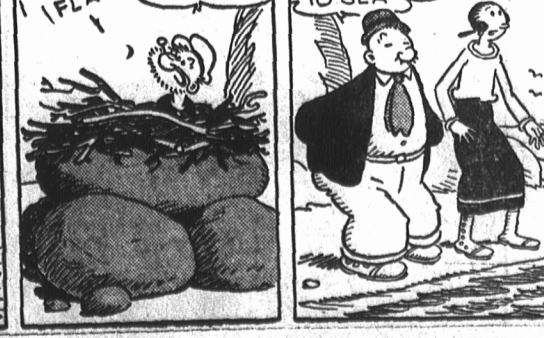
Disappearance of Mrs. Edna Smith
