LONDON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Russian and Romanian armies chopped holes in Axis lines along the Czech-Polish border and in Northern Transylvania today, and also penetrated into the strategic rail city of Oradea in their massive three-way drive aimed at knocking Hungary out of the war.

Legion Objects To Preference Given Draftees

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Sept. 30—An argument of long standing between the defence department and the Canadian Legion was brought to a head today when J. C. G. Herwig, general secretary of the Legion, in a letter to defence Minister Ralston asked that draftees in the directorate of records be removed. The question first arose, Mr. Herwig said, when it was reported last January that large numbers of draftees were being brought in from outside points to handle an increasing part of the work in the recruiting branch. At that time the matter was drawn to the attention of the defence department which volunteered personnel and civilians alike were resentful of the influx of R. M. A. men.

Local Student Awarded New Scholarship

MONTREAL, Sept. 29 (CP)—McGill University tonight announced gift of 12 scholarships by the J. W. McConnell Memorial Trust. The scholarships, each covering full tuition fees and cost of board and residence for students in the Faculty of Arts and Science or the Faculty of Engineering. The scholarships will be open on equal terms to men and women residents in any part of Canada and Newfoundland, and are good for four years in the Faculty of Arts and Science, or five years in the Faculty of Engineering. Terms provide that in the case of a student living far from Montreal, a contribution toward railroad fares may also be made.

Drew Plans Big Electric Power Projects

OTTAWA, Sept. 29 (AP)—Premier George Drew of Ontario today announced that negotiations would be started immediately with the Quebec government for development of six power sites on the Ottawa River between Desjardins to Carillon in Quebec. He said the newly-created power would transform Eastern Ontario into "one of the greatest industrial sections of Canada." Construction of the projects would start at the beginning of demobilization of the armed forces. Former power agreements between Liberal administrations in Ontario and Quebec had been cancelled because they would have been detrimental to the industrial development of the Ottawa Valley. The old agreements contemplated export of power to industrial centres as far away as Windsor. He added: "It is my conviction that a reversal of that process makes more sense—we would develop industries close to the source of power."

War Situation Last Night

(Associated Press War Analysis) Current Allied operations on the European west front indicate virtually continuous pressure on Nazi defence lines from the lower Rhine to the Belfort Gap. Coupled with the scope of Allied bombings of German supply lines, they strongly suggest Allied preparations for multiple simultaneous power assaults.

Will Relax Tire Rationing After Defeat Of Germany

SARNIA, Ont., Sept. 29 (CP)—Tire rationing restrictions will be gradually relaxed, starting within a few months of the collapse of Germany, Munitions Minister Howe said today. He made the announcement in a statement to newspapermen attending a ceremony celebrating the first anniversary of synthetic rubber production in Canada at the Government-owned Polysar Plant near here in his address at the ceremony, he said he favors the idea of a bright future for it in the manufacture of chemicals and plastics.

Pair To Hang For Hot-Stove Torture Death

PORT FRANCES, Ont. Sept. 29 (CP)—George and Anthony Skrypnik, William Schmidt and Elio Filomeno tonight were sentenced to hang Dec. 6 for the hot-stove torture death of Mrs. Viola Janzow, 49, of Flanders, Ont., home last July 2. The judgement disregarded the recommendation of a 12-man Ontario Superior Court jury for mercy for Tillson, 19-year-old Port Arthur youth.

N. B. Utilities Chairman Dies

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Sept. 29 (CP)—P. Jones, K. C., 77, chairman of the New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities and New Brunswick Motor Carrier Board, died in hospital here today. He had been in a hospital patient for several weeks. A member of the New Brunswick legislature from 1902 to 1908 he served as solicitor-general of the province. He was elected leader of the New Brunswick Liberal Party in 1910 and it will gradually be assumed as head of the public utilities and motor carrier boards.

Nazis Say Emphasis On Southern Sector

LONDON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Allied Armies pressed the Germans back tonight at opposite ends of the 450-mile western front—at Arnhem, where the enemy blew up approaches to the Neder Rhine bridge to balk pursuit through Northern Holland, and in mountain strongholds 11 miles west of France's Belfort Gateway to Southern Germany.

Hero Of D-Day Killed In Action

(The BBC said the first snow of autumn was falling on Allied troops closing in on Belfort Gap.) In a concerted drive to the north, the 7th Army bent back enemy lines along the Siegfried Line and struck toward four passes through the Vosges mountains on other routes to Hitler's frontier at the Rhine.

Regional Transit Controller Resigns

OTTAWA, Sept. 29 (CP)—A. C. Wagner, Halifax, has resigned as regional director of Transit Canada for the Maritime Provinces to return to civilian business, the Munitions Department announced today. E. G. Meever, Halifax, acting as assistant regional director, has been appointed director, effective Oct. 1.

Robot Launching Heinkels Downed

LONDON, Sept. 29 (CP)—Flying bombs fired at London and today caused slight damage, but no casualties and two of the Heinkels 111 bombers from which they were launched, were shot down over the North Sea.

Tito's Partisans Close To Belgrade

LONDON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Mihailovic himself was among the southern counties before dawn today at Leznica, 55 miles southwest of Belgrade, and the Partisans captured Leznica and inflicted 700 casualties.

Record Seed Potato Crop Is Expected

What is possibly a record in potato cultivation in Prince Edward Island became known today when it was learned from Mr. S. G. Peppin, in charge of seed inspection for the Province, that 96 per cent of the total acreage under inspection has passed all tests. Broken up into the different varieties, 7,100 acres of cobbler passed as certified seed, 3,800 acres of Green Mountains, 1,800 acres of Katabidins, 1,000 acres of Sabago, and 50 acres of other varieties, making a total of 13,500 acres. Indications are that the yield in King's County per acre will greatly exceed that of either Queen's or Prince Mr. Peppin attributes this to the fact that the drought was more severe in Queen's County and the eastern part of Prince. The crop is much heavier in Eastern King's and Western Prince than in other sections of the Province.

Announcement was made at the dinner that 25 members of the 500-bushel potato club had averaged 238 bushels an acre the previous average was 80.100 bushels.
