BRITAIN BUYS MORE CANADIAN PRODUCE

LONDON, Sept. 23 (CP) — Slight relaxation in import regulations on fruit and fresh vegetables during the first six months of 1947 benefited Canada and the

United States more than any other supplying country, Board of Trade figures show. In the six months ended June 30 Britain bought 2,144,756 hundredweight of fresh fruit and vegetables from Canada for £2,850,000 (\$11,400,000) compared with 1,827,311 hundredweight for £415,235 in the same period of 1946. United States shipments jumped from 68 hundredweight worth £227 in 1946 to 1,417,247 hundredweight worth £3,889,540 in 1947. The Canadian shipments were mainly apples, 663,746 hundredweight worth £1,806,828 being exported in six months this year compared with 162,725 hundredweight worth £415,217 in six months of 1946. Purchases of Canadian tobacco more than doubled in the first six months of 1947 although total imports dropped to 149,566,752 pounds from 216,962,454 in the same period of 1946. Canadian tobacco exports to the United Kingdom to June 30 were 18,934,000 pounds against 7,914,000 in the same period last year and \$,046,806 in 1946. United States sales dropped from 151,689,838 pounds in six months of 1946 to 106,975,157 in 1947.

MRS. ELLSWORTH NEWSOME

Mrs. Ellsworth Newsome left the scenes of the sea, she loved to well to gaze upon, for the seas of crystal and river of life on August 25th, 1947. The Lamb of God taketh away a dear mother and darling wife at the age of 54 years. She was never known to complain till a few days before her sudden death, when on her way home from her mother's, while waiting for the Bus at Cornwall, she was stricken suddenly with heart attack. Kind friends and nurses gave first aid, until the Doctor arrived and he had her taken to her mother's home again, where she rallied and went home on Sunday with her husband feeling fine. On Monday evening she decided to go and see her own Doctor Downing at Borden, and on entering the office on the arm of her mother-in-law and friend Mrs. Ian MacGregor, suddenly took another heart attack and God opened the gates to one of his children, for in my father's house there are many mansions. I have come to prepare a place for you. The deceased was dressed in her wedding dress of light blue and rested in a light grey casket, covered with flowers. The pall bearers were three brothers-in-law, Eric Bonell, Franklin Fickett, Chalmer Newson, Wendell and Gerald MacPadyen, and Kenneth Cameron. NEW BREATH-SMELLING DEVICE TO TEST DRUNK-DRIVERS

Here is the story of a new drunk-driver, breath-smelling machine that almost takes your breath away with its simplicity. For the assistance of traffic officers and traffic court officials, an "alcoholometer" has been invented at Yale University, to provide a scientific method of obtaining drunken driving convictions. The driver being tested breathes into the machine, the operator pushes a button, and eight minutes later takes a meter reading of the percentage of alcohol in the blood. Previous methods of testing drunkenness required the use of a laboratory, skilled technician, and considerable time, but the new "alcoholometer" is portable and can be plugged into an ordinary wall socket and requires no special training to operate. Any police officer can operate it quickly wherever there is electric wiring. The machine works on the principle that the radiowaves the concentration of alcohol in a person's breath and his blood is constant.
