Lady Davis Now Mrs. Eric Loder

NEW YORK, Oct. 26—The New York American says Lady Davis, widow of Sir Mortimer Davis, Canadian multi-millionaire, secretly married Major Eric R. Loder at Long Beach, N. J., last December 17.

The couple are stopping her for a short time, the paper said before going to Montreal, where legal actions involving the Davis estate still are pending. Later they expect to go to the French Riviera, the papers added, to live at Mrs. Loder's villa. The marriage, became known, it said, at a supper party last night.

Mrs. Loder, formerly Eleanor Curran, of New Orleans, first married Count Moroni, an attaché of the Italian consulate in her native city. They were divorced in 1924, and in that same year she married Sir Mortimer, who left a fortune estimated up to \$150,000,000.

Sir Mortimer presented his wife with jewels worth more than \$1,000,000 as a wedding gift. His son, "Morty" Davis, was married a few years ago to "Rostie" Dolly, one of the celebrated Dolly sisters, but they were divorced.

Mrs. Loder has been a leader in Parisian society as well as in New York and Canada.

Major Loder, popular in London society, first married Gabrielle Ray the English actress. They were divorced shortly after the outbreak of the Great War, and in 1920 he married Lady Lawson, granddaughter of the late Lord FitzGerald. By that marriage, which ended in a divorce in 1928, Loder has a 12-year-old daughter, Pamela. He is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Basil Loder of Aldwobury, Hertfordshire, England, and a grandson of the late Sir Robert Loder.

AND FOXES

Disease on fox and mink ranches have caused severe losses in recent years. Researches by the Dominion Research Institute of the Dominion Department of Agriculture at Hull, P. Q., have established the fact that the principal disease among the animals is caused by a filterable virus which has some of the characteristics of canine distemper virus. Arctic sledge dogs are affected with an apparently similar disease, which is also included in the institute's investigations. Virus strains obtained from fox and mink ranches are under study together with canine distemper viruses. For this purpose a large number of compound-bred animals, particularly foxes, dogs and cats, or ferrets, are required, and these are bred and raised at the institute. Extensive experiments and trials are in progress with the object of developing vaccine and serums for protective treatment and immunization.

RECALL LUCKNOW DURING SIEGES

CHELTHAM, England, Oct. 26—(C.P.). A man and a woman who were children living in the residency at Lucknow during the Indian Mutiny 76 years ago, when Generals Outram and Havelock cut through the mutineers who were besieging the city and joined hands with the British garrison before being themselves invested, met at a re-union dinner at Cheltenham recently.

They are Arthur F. Dashwood, of London, who was born during the siege, and Mrs. Kathleen Haynes, daughter of Thomas Henry Kavanagh, whose heroism in escaping through native lines in disguise and guiding Sir Colin Campbell's relief force into the city was rewarded with the Victoria Cross. It is said that of all the children in Lucknow at the time only nine survive.
