—AT TRENTON.—Mr. John McInnis, Point Pleasant, who was one of the recent arrivals at Trenton, has taken a position as checker in the shipping room at the Steel Works.—Mr. James McInnis of Seikirk Station, Lot 42, King's Co., who has held a responsible position as foreman of the Steel Works left for home recently. Previous to his departure he was waited on by his brother foreman and presented with a valuable fountain pen as a mark of the esteem in which he is held by his associates. The presentation was made by Mr. Bert Tucker, in a neat speech to which Mr. McInnis suitably replied. The party then enjoyed an automobile drive around town, after which they repaired to the residence of Mr. George Tanner, night superintendent at the Steel Works, where they partook of a dainty lunch, spread in Mrs. Tanner's best style, and spent the evening very agreeably in social conversation, music, etc. Mr. McInnis has been employed in the Steel Works for upwards of three years and holds an enviable reputation for trustworthiness and efficiency.—&

—THE WAR BEE.—The second steel ship built at the Trenton shipyard was successfully launched some time ago and is now having her interior finished preparatory to crossing the Atlantic to enter the service of the Imperial Munitions Board for whom she was built. The Captain and crew of twenty men have arrived from the Old Country and will take charge of vessel as soon as she is ready for voyage. The Captain, who is a native of Greenock, Scotland, has had the experience of having his last ship torpedoed by a German submarine. The "War Bee" is painted a dull grey and carries a swivel gun mounted aft, as a defence against the U-boats. The third ship, which will be called the "War Hornet," is now well under way and will be completed as rapidly as possible.—&

—FOUR DROWNED OFF CARAQUET DURING SQUALL

—CARAQUET, June 20.—One of the most serious accidents which have occurred in the fishing industry of this vicinity since the disastrous storm of some years ago happened yesterday off here when a schooner was caught in a heavy wind and upset, four men losing their lives. The dead are: Capt. Joseph F. Dolron, aged 36 years. James Dolron, his brother, aged 25 years.

Pierre S. Hebert, aged 30 years. George Mallet aged 25. The bodies of Capt. Dolron and his brother were recovered. All four men belonged to the village of St. Simon, about seven miles southeast of Caraquet.
