VICTORIA WELCOMES HER BOYS

The citizens of Victoria and the surrounding districts met in the public hall on June 3rd to do honor to their returned heroes. The evening being favorable for the occasion a very large crowd was in attendance. Before the program a very sumptuous banquet for the returned men and their parents and the parents of those who had not yet returned, as well as the clergymen of Crapaud and Tryon and the politicians was prepared by the ladies of the district. All who partook of the banquet felt in pretty good humor for what was about to follow. The supper being ended the spacious platform was cleared quickly of the tables and soon filled again by the returned soldiers, nursing sister Lieut. Olga P. Myers, Lieut. Harrison Villett, Lieut. Harry Lea, G. Ira Trowsdale, Ptes. Carl Trowsdale, Pierceson Trowsdale Reid, Miller, Clayton Miller, William Wright, Windsor McLean and Bombadier Keith Boswell, the speakers of the evening. At 8 o'clock the doors were thrown open to the public and in a very short time the building was literally packed to its utmost capacity and many were unable to gain an entrance. Victoria has a just right to be proud of her sons and daughters, for she sent to take part in the world struggle, 31 of the former and two of the latter, two of which will never again return viz: Lieut. A. L. Collett and Pte. Heath McQuarrie.

Mr. W. M. Lea, M. P. occupied the chair, and after an introductory speech the following programme began. Opening chorus, "Over all the World," by choir. Musical exercise and reading of J. P. McEvoy's "End of a Perfect Day" followed by solo and chorus, "Home Bells are Ringing," solo parts taken by Miss Neavy Myers and Mrs. Thos. Bell, Military drill by the school children. Solo "War Veterans Song," by Lieut. Harrison Villett (encored). Chorus "Freedom's Day," a popular chorus celebrating the return of the overseas forces—solo part taken by Mrs. J. W. Windsor. Solo and chorus—Vanduyk's "Home Again" solo part by Miss Mary Inman.

The programme was interspersed with speeches by Rev. Wm. Deathe, Rev. T. Hubley, D. D., Rev. P. A. Fitzpatrick, B. A., Messrs. Cyrus Crosby, M. P., A. J. McNevin, M.P., John Myers ex-M. P. and E. H. Wright.  
Worthy of special mention was the military drill by the school children, who acted their parts remarkably well.  
The following resolution was proposed by the Rev. Wm. Deathe, seconded by Rev. T. Hubley that this meeting now being held in Victoria, P. E. I. in honour of our returned conquerors, pass a vote of welcome to the brides now coming to Canada to form part of our corporate life. The resolution was passed with much enthusiasm.

Mr. McPhee enlisted in 1915 in the 105th Battalion and after his preliminary training in Charlottetown went across to England and thence into active service with the famous "fighting 26th" to which he was transferred. He took part in some memorable engagements but providentially escaped with a minor face wound of which nothing remains at present but a slight scar.

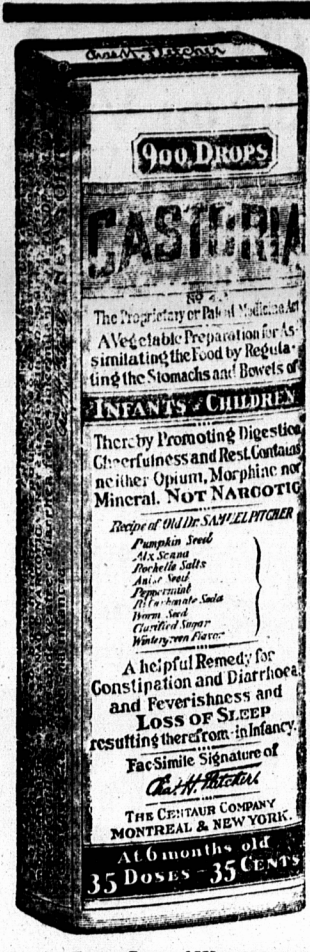
