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Mother Of Six Held For Murder

(By The Canadian Press) TIMMINS, Ont., March 5 - Six shivering and hungry children this morning fled through the door of the Children's Aid Society shelter here and only the eldest knew their father had been slain, probably with an axe, and their mother was charged with the murder.

Clara Irene St. Cyr, 32, full-blooded Iroquois Indian, was held by police who responded to her frantic telephone calls and found Jerome St. Cyr dead on a blood-stained bed. The jugular vein of the 32-year-old laborer had been slashed and his jaw broken, and police said an axe found in the snow at the rear of the frail, tar-papered house probably was the weapon used.

Police Chief Albert Lepic said the wife, a little woman of five feet, one inch, made a full confession. "As far as I know, he was struck only once," the Police Chief said. "He must have been killed instantly for I don't think he even twitched a muscle." Late today Gregory T. Evans, Timmins barrister, said he had been retained by two brothers of Mrs. St. Cyr to defend her in court. An autopsy was ordered.

Duplessis Comments On Polish Treasures

QUEBEC, March 5 - (CP) - Premier Duplessis said tonight in the Legislative Assembly, he would discuss the Polish treasures again "at the proper time."

"We shall see who is telling the truth," the Premier said after Leon Casgrain (L - Riviere du Loup) had criticized him for "discrediting Mr. St. Laurent as a collaborator of Stalin." Mr. Casgrain said the Premier was "making himself ridiculous."

Earlier, Premier Duplessis criticized what he called the "particularly reprehensible attitude of the Federal authorities" on the Polish treasure question and said he would comment further in a "few days."

Russian Scientists Told To Remember Party In Work

By J. M. Roberts, Jr. Associated Press News Analyst Russian scientists have just been warned by the Soviet Minister of Higher Education that they'd better remember the "party character" of their work.

Thus business of being too knooped by Western scientists can lead to "anti-state, anti-patriotic actions," they are told. They are not told, presumably because telling is unnecessary, that it can also lead to loss of their professional and possibly their anatomical heads.

In Russia, the microscope must be used as a mouthpiece. It's all a part of the current Soviet campaign against people who write music or books or express economic theories which fall to serve as Communist propaganda.

To Americans this makes the Soviet incredible or laughable, or creates a deep feeling of pity. But it also has its practical aspects for which the anti-Communist countries can be thankful. It is going to have a dampening effect on the advances of Russian science.

In a recent discussion of the hereditary effects of chromosomes and genes before the Cooper Union Forum, Frederick Osborn told an interesting little story.

Science has proved definitely that genes and chromosomes, combined with but not controlled by environment, produce the individual man.

But, Osborn reminds, the mechanism of the chromosome and gene was officially repudiated by Dr. Lysenko, now director of the Institute of Genetics of the Soviet Academy of Science. The laws of Mendel and Morgan are false, Dr. Lysenko said, because they fail to conform to dialectical materialism.

As a result, the Russian geneticist Vavilov was removed as director of the Institute and replaced by Lysenko, and Vavilov died in Siberia. This happened some time ago, and is brought to mind by recent shifts which have put a propaganda expert in the place of President Zhebrak of the White Russian Academy of Science.

Frank said: "Zhebrak, as a Soviet scientist, ought to have unmasked the class meaning of the struggle taking place in connection with the problem of genetics but, blinded by bourgeois prejudices, by a contemptible subservience to bourgeois science, he adopted the view of the enemy camp."

Osborn said he believed the Vavilov case grew out of a story of 87 pairs of identical twins being reared in different environments in a study of heredity.

"Evidently there was danger that such an experiment might show that all men were not created equal in genetic potential, and in fear that it might be contrary to Marx, it had to be stopped."

The Communist propagandists will certainly run into a lot of scientific subversion if they ever achieve their aim of taking over the United States.

Mad Pianist Remains Patient In Insane Asylum

DETROIT, March 5 - (AP) - Out at lonely Eloise, the delicate music of the mad pianist still echoes through quiet corridors.

Maestro X still is a patient two years after he startled the music world with his beautiful piano playing.

Dr. T. K. Gruber, superintendent of Wayne County General Hospital at Eloise, said he still is completely mad in everything except his music.

"We noted improvement for a time," Gruber said. "But the improvement has stopped. He just sits or stands and vegetates."

The maestro, whose name never was revealed by the hospital, was a brilliant student of music. He was committed to the asylum a decade ago, suffering a split personality.

In search for a means to bring him back to reality, the hospital turned his attention back to his music.

At first an attendant had to turn the pages otherwise he would play the same page over and over. He appeared before a national education conference. He amazed recognized teachers of music with the beauty and clarity of his piano artistry.

Later he performed in public. Millions heard him play Mozart's difficult "concerto in D minor" on a national radio broadcast.

Then he returned to the insane, the obscurity of the insane. Gruber emphasized that the mad pianist has not been given up as incurable. Almost daily efforts are made to interest him in his surroundings.

"But he remains out of touch with reality in everything except his music," the superintendent said. "If we ever are able to help him, however, we feel we may open an important avenue for others like him."
