ization of Kingston, Ontario, the second largest of its kind in Canada, with a membership of over 3,000. Passed BY A UNANIMOUS VOTE.—"Deploiring the action of certain veterans in Toronto on the occasion of the recent visit of Premier Meighen there, expressing appreciation of and endorsing the Premier's determination to maintain the open door in respect to the question of complete re-establishment, and declaring finally their confidence in the Premier and their strong conviction that he and his Government will accord the veterans the fullest measure of support consistent with the present conditions of the Dominion." These things more certainly present the feelings of the returned soldiers throughout Canada than does the disturber Flynn, whose uncouth and unpatriotic conduct is a byword in the country, so false in his misrepresentations of the Government that Sir George E. Foster, Acting Premier, enforced his removal from a delegation before he would receive it, and whose limited backing represents only a small percentage of the soldiers of Toronto.

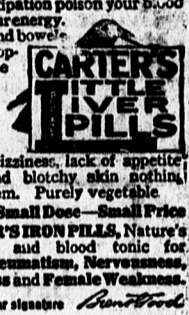

### THE EMPIRE STEEL MERGER

TORONTO, Nov. 29.—With reference to the British Empire Steel corporation merger organized early this year, the financial editor of the Globe will say tomorrow, "There is reason to believe that the whole matter is undergoing much consideration on the part of those interested; in fact, it would not be surprising if the arrangements made during the summer with the various companies would be subject to a complete revision before anything final is adopted. The Globe claims that the exchange situation has made the financing of the original scheme impracticable without the assumption of a loss by the Canadian companies which would be larger than they were ready to assume." In

view of the partial closing down of both the Dominion Steel Company and the Nova Scotia Steel Company because of labor troubles, the Globe states that conditions do not seem favorable for carrying out of the original amalgamating without full consideration of the plans mentioned," says Globe "is the coldness with which the proposed deal has been received in influential circles, which coldness coupled with the difficulties might be removed by a proper revision of the arrangement."

### MISS MARGARET DICKERSON

Many friends were grieved to learn of the death of Miss Margaret Dickieson of Charlottetown, who passed away on the evening of November 6th after a short illness, in the ninety-seventh year of her age.

Miss Dickieson was a native of New Glasgow where she lived for many years, an active and honored life among her relatives and neighbors.

Early in life she identified herself with the Christian Church at New Glasgow, of which she remained a member until her death. Some twenty years ago she moved to Charlottetown where she has since resided with her sister, Mrs. Benjamin Williams. Owing to her advanced age she lived a quiet unassuming life, seldom going abroad, but enjoying the friendship of a wide circle of acquaintances, to whom she was always familiarly known as "Aunt Margaret."

Born of the old Scottish stock of Pioneer settlers at a time when conditions were difficult and hard work the rule, she has shared in the development of the community of New Glasgow, and has seen the transformation from the forest to the highly cultivated condition of the prosperous settlement of New Glasgow as it exists today.

Her father, the late James Dickieson emigrated from the parish to Houston in Scotland, and afterwards married Catherine Stevenson a daughter of John S. Stevenson who was also among the emigrants. Mr. Stevenson was a weaver by trade of the City of Paisley, and from him in her early years Miss Dickieson learned the art of the home manufacture of flax and wool in all the various processes. Her skill in this work was unusual and her interest in the industry never faded. Though changing conditions rendered such unnecessary she retained her spinning wheel in active use until quite recently and her hand knit socks contributed to the comfort of soldiers at the front on many occasions during the war.

In matters of current events she was a keen observer, and a wide reader, retaining her faculties almost unimpaired until the end. In August last she attended the Centennial Celebration at New Glasgow as the oldest inhabitant. Here she spent some weeks among

friends and relatives returning to the city on her birthday October 6th.
