SDU-PWC Meet Today In Intercollegiate Series

The Saints, who lead the series by a win and a tie against a loss and a tie, could wind up the series today with a victory, while a win for the P.W.C. boys will force the series into a fourth game.

\$250,000 Damage In Minto Skating Club Fire

OTTAWA, Nov. 3 — (CP) — An early-morning fire today ripped through the historic Minto Skating Club, home of many of Canada's most famous figure skaters.

The official opening of the 1949-50 season had been planned for tonight. Instead directors will meet to map ways and means of rebuilding the rink and carrying on this season's activities.

Damage was estimated at more than \$250,000. The cause of the fire is unknown.

Destroyed, too, were the entire records of the Canadian Figure Skating Association and some 50 trophies won through the years by club members.

Many of the 500 members lost hundreds of dollars worth of equipment.

INGLEWOOD, Calif., Nov. 3 — (AP) — Mr. Morris Scott dropped down in class today and won the feature race at Hollywood Park's Grand Circuit harness racing.

The horse from Great Neck, N. Y., closed in the final stages to whip six others in the mile-and-one-sixteenth race, timed at 2:10.4.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 — (AP) — The International Boxing Club today moved the Roland La Starza-Cesar Brion heavyweight match into the Dec. 2 Madison Square Garden date after negotiations fell through for a non-title bout between middleweight champ Jake LaMotta and Robert Villamain of France.

The La Starza-Brion bout, bringing together two of the better young heavyweights, originally was set for Dec. 9. A new match will be lined up for that opening.

Jim Norris, I. B. C. president, said Jake refused to go along with the television schedule agreed upon by the Boxing Managers Guild and the I. B. C. The normal TV out for each Garden main bout performer is \$1,000.

Originally LaMotta was to have defended his title Dec. 2 against ex-champ Marcel Cerdan. Cerdan was killed in a plane crash Friday, en route to start training for the bout.

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IN THE CORNER

A large turnout of Saint Dunstan's University hockeyists, some 30 in all, hit the ice at the Forum yesterday afternoon for the first hockey practice session of the season. They were directed by coach A. J. McAdam.

Although many new aspirants for this year's intercollegiate squad made their appearance yesterday, many of last year's squad were also there in force including such well known performers on former S.D.U. lineups as Mike Hennessey, Joe Mahar, Reg Rodgers, Will Houde, Kiker McIsaac, Mark McQuaid and George McRae, who performed with Prince of Wales College last year, and others.

With yesterday's session more or less just a warm-up affair, with practically all 30 on the ice at once, there of course was not much opportunity of seeing how the new ones, are shaping up in pre-season form, but nevertheless there were some new likely looking prospects in evidence.

However, it will be some time yet after coach McAdam gets them weeded out a bit to form up a regular squad, before one will be able to get an idea as to the calibre of hockey that can be expected from this quarter for the coming season, although there is no doubt that as always, the Saints will be coming up with some of the individual players particularly the keenest type of competition in Island hockey circles.

An old reliable, who had been performing on the Saints roster for the past few years, not only in hockey but football as well, in the person of Carl Macdonald, was not to be seen with his teammates. Carl is attending St. Francis Xavier University this year, and has been missed greatly on this year's rugby squad and will also leave a vacancy on the hockey squad that will be hard to fill.

With the annual meeting of the City Hockey League scheduled to be held tonight at eight o'clock at the Forum, it will not be long now before local fans will be able to get an idea of what the 1949-50 season will hold for them in the way of local hockey competition, over and above what is already known of other plans being drafted out for this season.

Just what will develop out of tonight's meeting, we can only guess at for the moment, but there is no doubt that one thing will be decided before the meeting winds up, and that will be the continuing of the City Hockey League again this year, and the clubs decided that will be participating in that league.

Promoters Harry Poulton and Buddy Lund reported yesterday that they have everything pretty well lined up for their big five-bout boxing card slated for the Whelan Memorial Hall this Tuesday night, October 8th, which will be the second in their string of bouts planned for every two weeks or so throughout the winter. The boys staged their opening night here three weeks ago which produced some of the smartest bouts that have been witnessed here for a long time, and are planning on the forthcoming one being equally successful.

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The remaining 11 votes were scattered among six first-year men, Willie (Puddin'head) Jones, outfielder; Tom Seaver, Pittsburgh Pirates; second-baseman Mike Goltz, Phils, and third-baseman Pete Castiglione, Pirates.
