COUNTY COURT.—At the Queen's County Court on Tuesday, the case was heard of Frederick Mosher vs. James Gilbert. The case had been tried and at the last October term of the County Court judgment had been given in favor of the plaintiff for \$25, the amount he claimed to be due for the balance of the price. The defendant claimed that he had made payment of \$20 to Mosher on October 5, 1913, at defendant's place of residence in Bristol, and he made an application to the judge for leave to have a new trial. To this the plaintiff consented and a new trial took place on Tuesday. Evidence was given by both parties and the matter stands over for further consideration.

LARGE SHIPMENTS.—During the past few days, the Dominion Express has handled through Moncton, a very large quantity of turkeys, coming from P. E. Island for the Christmas trade in the United States and Newfoundland Monday, six truck loads, each truck load consisting of ten barrels and each barrel having about thirty-seven turkeys, were shipped from Moncton through Moncton. PROMOTION.—The following is from the Saskatoon Phoenix:—E. J. Mellicke, for several years chairman of the Provincial Licensing Board has resigned his position, and George W. McPhee, solicitor of Saskatoon, formerly of Charlottetown, has been appointed to succeed him. The change takes effect on December 15th, and it is made necessary by the fact that Mr. Mellicke wishes to spend the winter at the coast, and for some years has been anxious to be relieved of his duties, which made it necessary for him to spend practically all of his time in the Province. Mr. McPhee, upon whom Mr. Mellicke's duties devolve, is well known in Saskatoon as one of the rising lawyers of the West, and it is partly to his ability in his profession that his appointment is due. He came to Saskatoon early in 1911 from Prince Edward Island, where he had been a member of the legislature there. However, the West seemed to offer a greater inducement to him than political honours, and he decided to come to Saskatoon, and his arrival here he has built up a large and successful practice, and his many friends in the city will be glad to learn of his appointment to such a responsible position.

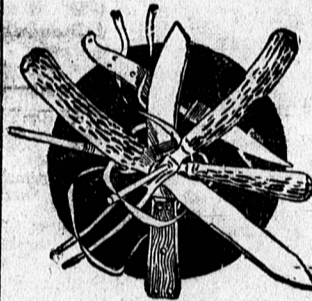

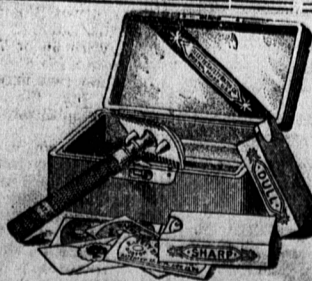
