FIGURE WEALTH OF ROCKEFELLERS AT \$2,400,000,000 NEW YORK, August 18.—Henry H. Klein, first deputy commissioner of accounts of the city of New York, who in his book, estimated the fortune of John D. Rockefeller, and the members of his family, at \$2,400,000,000, has given further figures of the Rockefeller holdings, tending to show that the estate of the elder Rockefeller is steadily decreasing as the result of distribution of his wealth among other members of his family.

Mr. Klein's statement was in reply to a letter written by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., in which he said his father's estate had never reached \$1,000,000,000 and has been materially reduced by the large gifts from principal which Mr. Rockefeller has made during recent years.

Rockefeller's comment was the result of reviews of Mr. Klein's book, "Dynastic America," which he made in a statement to the size of the Rockefeller holdings.

"Nowhere was it written or said that Mr. Rockefeller's estate reached a billion dollars or any other sum," said Mr. Klein in his statement, made in the newspapers in the reviewing my book was that I estimate the Rockefeller fortune at \$2,400,000,000.
