The latest news, first of all.

—Dr. R. H. McDonald, North Bedouque, left last evening via Charlottetown for New York where he has secured a position in one of the hospitals there.

—Johnson R. Reinhart, engineer of the steamer Bedouque, Summerside, left last night for Halifax where he has secured a position for the winter as an engineer on a large tug boat.

—The steamer Liberty which arrived at Mulgrave from P. E. Island the first part of last week lost a large amount of cargo. The steamer Decapo from Summerside arrived also reporting loss of anchor and chain. Ex.

—The prices of produce in Summerside showed little change with a fair quantity moving, white oats sold at forty cents, black at forty one cent, potatoes twenty cents, turnips thirteen cents, hay eight dollars and seventy to nine dollars, butter twenty-two to twenty three cents, eggs twenty three cents, fowl six cents per pound, chicken three cents, ten cents ducks, geese twelve cents, pork six and three quarters, to seven and a half cents per pound.

—The following is a speech from the throne of the Mock Parliament held by court Minnewawa, I. O. F., Bedouque. Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: I am happy to meet you in general assembly to obtain your advice and assistance in reference to the affairs of the Province. It affords me extreme satisfaction to congratulate you upon the abundance of the year's harvest. The progress that the people of this Province have made in agriculture and other industries was well attested at the exhibitions and seed fairs held during the present year. It is the intention of the present Government to add the farmers by a system of underdrainage on their farms and marsh lands. You will be asked to give your careful consideration to several measures that will be submitted to you among which will be the following: To tax mail order houses doing business in the Province to the detriment of our own merchants. To assist our stock raisers in operating with their neighbours in obtaining for their surplus stock the highest prices that the markets of the world afford. To amend the Road Act that the people in each township can repair the roads in the summer and keep roads open in winter. Road tax collected in each township to be used directly for that purpose, apportioned when necessary by a Government grant. To purchase the Telephone Company's plant now in operation, with a view of extending it to the residence of every citizen and give better service at lowest possible rates. To build a railway from some point on the trunk line to Pelouque. To amend the election law so as to prohibit personal canvass by candidates on their agents. I feel sure that these several measures will receive your most careful consideration. The public accounts for the past year will be brought down in the course of a few days and the estimates for the ensuing year will be submitted. I am persuaded that all has been done by my advisers that economy and the needs of the public service demand. I leave you to your labors and the guidance of the Most High. John Rudolph Bowness, Lieutenant Governor.
