The largely attended funeral, the expressions of sorrow over the loss of so honoured and loyal a friend, the co-operation and sympathy offered the bereaved will ever be regarded as a cherished memory in the hearts of those who loved him so well. Interment took place in the adjoining cemetery where the obsequies were performed by the pastor who had so kindly attended him during his later years of life.

The building, and signs have received a fresh coat of paint, and the Prince Edward Island Coat of Arms has been artistically painted on the front of the building. A new front platform has also been erected. Mr. Inman informs the Government representative, Hon. B. W. LePage, that there is a great difference in the type of tourists passing this year, whereas last year, about 50% of those calling were on their annual trip to visit relatives, this year a great majority are real tourists. Mr. Inman also believes that there will be a greatly increased number of summer visitors to the Island this year.

Mayor Henry F. Hall Dies in 41st Year
WAS PROMINENT PAPER COMPOSER OFFICIAL
(Montreal Star July 19)
The funeral of Major Henry Forsyth Hall, of Madeleine River, Quebec, where he was manager for the Brown Corporation, paper manufacturers, will take place tomorrow at Quebec, the service being held in the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity. Major Hall died in the Royal Victoria Hospital here yesterday after a brief illness. He was born in Quebec in 1896, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. C. J. Hall of that city. He was educated at Quebec High School and as a cadet was selected to attend the coronation of King George V. He was also a member of the Canadian team that participated in an Empire shoot. At the outbreak of war in 1914 he joined the 2nd Battalion of the First Division as a private, gaining a commission at Valcartier training camp and serving continuously throughout the war, being twice mentioned in despatches and winning the Military Cross.
He was appointed to the staff of the late Gen. Sir David Watson in France. After the armistice he remained to conduct parties through the battlefields, and on returning to Canada became connected with the Brown Corporation and was well known in the Gaspé district. Major Hall was a member of the Garrison Club of Quebec, a director of the Fire Protection Association, and at the time of his death was working on an Anglican mission chapel on the Madeleine River. He is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Jessie Montague Johnston; a daughter, Miss Leslie Hall; a son, John Hall; a sister, Mrs. George Fidler, of Moncton, N. B.; and three nephews.
