The Societies of the Cove parish have promised adoptions from May 1st. One hundred and twelve prisoners are now provided for by the Island Fund.

### ENJOYABLE EVENING WITH THE A.O.H.

Under the auspices of the A. O. H. and with Mr. Hugh Connors presiding, a most pleasing entertainment was given Wednesday evening in their hall, Queen Street. His Worship presided at the table, with Mr. Nash in the vice-chair and the following present:
