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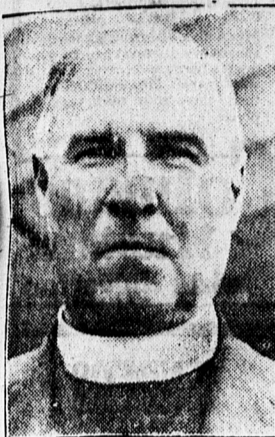

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Aug. 14.—The Marquis of Londonderry who is a great coal mine owner speaking in Wales last night, intimated that if A. J. Cook, General Secretary of the Miners' Federation, challenged parliamentarianism, a revolution would be brought about and the result would be disastrous to the trades unions of Great Britain generally and they would be smashed from top to bottom.

GERMANY ORDERS FREE ENTRANCE VISAS TO COMPETING SPORTSMEN

(Associated Press) BERLIN, Aug. 14.—The German foreign office has instructed its representatives throughout Europe and North America to grant visas free of charge to all foreign sportsmen coming to Germany for sporting competitions of any description. The measure is the result of a request by the German Sporting Union, which also had asked that the foreign office take up with other governments the question of reciprocal passports for German sportsmen taking part in foreign competitions.

Canadian Teachers Federation In Session

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Aug. 14.—A standardized form of contract to be presented to the Provincial Department of Education for adoption throughout the Dominion was unanimously supported at yesterday's session of the Canadian Teachers' Federation. The following officers were elected for ensuing year: R. E. Howe, B. A. Westmount, President, M. J. Caldwell, Regina, Vice President, G. J. Elliott, B. A. Winnipeg, Secretary, Treasurer, Louis Wayne Prince Edward Island, was made a member of the executive. The delegates voted in favor of holding the 1926 convention in Charlottetown. Steps towards obtaining a representation in the senate of Canada for the Teachers' Federation were taken. Letters will be sent to the Premier and to the leader of the Opposition, asking them to aid in doing this.

Mrs. J. P. Morgan Dead

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Mrs. J. Pierpont Morgan died today at her home, Glencove, Long Island. Death was caused by a cardiac collapse following a two months illness from sleeping sickness.

Niagara Falls Are 'Committing Suicide'

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover told the Government today that Niagara Falls was slowly "committing suicide" and declared that in twelve years, unless engineering steps are taken to preserve them, the wings that form the horseshoe falls will have disappeared both on the Canadian and American sides.

British Cabinet Holds Extended Session

LONDON, Aug. 14.—The British Cabinet held an extended session at the Prime Minister's office in Downing Street yesterday, the Ministers devoting two hours and a half to consideration of various national problems during which was probably the last cabinet council before they leave for the long parliamentary holiday. Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain presided over the long session. The conversations held this week with Aristide Briand, French Foreign Minister, and submitted a copy of the proposed French reply to the last Gernot note concerning treaties of mutual guarantee and arbitration. With the amendments that were suggested by himself and accepted by Mr. Briand.

Marne To Supply Big Wheat Crop

(Associated Press) PARIS, Aug. 14.—The battle-field of the Marne, where the Americans helped the French turn the tide of war seven years ago, will furnish a bumper crop of wheat this year. The Department of the Marne and the Eure were rated at the end of June at 90 in the official crop estimates, while 80 is exceedingly good and far above the average of recent years. Thirty-three of the 80 departments were rated at 80 to 85, yet government officials are wondering whether they will not again this year be obliged to import some wheat to meet ordinary requirements. Agricultural experts say that while the crops look good, the rust has done much damage and that an early July estimate of 90,000,000 metric hundred weight or 324,000,000 bushels of wheat may now be reduced to about 238,000,000 bushels. France consumes about 325,000,000 bushels per year. The harvest which began recently in some departments, is just in time to keep the mills going, the stocks on hand having been practically exhausted, so that if the agricultural experts are nearer right than the official crop judges, France will have to buy abroad nearly as much wheat as she imported last year. It is pointed out, however, that the agriculturalists are always inclined to pessimism and fair judges opine that while France may be a little short of her requirements she will not need as much wheat from abroad as last year. EUROPE GROWS INDEPENDENT OF U.S. MONEY

LONDON Will Take Larger Part In International Financing. NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Increasing reservoirs of capital in a number of European countries are reducing the range of new foreign financing available for New York banking groups, and are even sending considerable quantities of European money to this country for investment. It was learned in Wall Street today. Holland and Switzerland, in particular, have reached the point where they are able to finance all their government and industrial needs in the home markets, and the same is true of Sweden. Denmark, which recently floated a bond issue in New York at 5 1/2 per cent., is expected to arrange further small pieces of financing here and then to rely on domestic investors. Due to an entirely different set of conditions, French money is also finding its way to New York for investment in amounts that are small individually, but quite large in the aggregate. Economic improvement in parts of Europe is an interesting factor in the field of international financing which since the war has been virtually all in the hands of American bankers. Foreign issues floated in New York this year have reached unprecedented figures and more are now being negotiated. In a number of instances recently American bankers' representatives abroad have been informed that rather than seeking funds, certain groups were interested in finding an outlet in this country for their surplus funds.

(Canadian Press) CALGARY, Aug. 14.—The first of Alberta's wheat harvest started rolling on the railroads last night. Two carloads of excellent quality wheat being shipped from Skiff to Medicine Hat.

Red Propaganda Floods British Army and Navy

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Communist propaganda aiming at discontent and disloyalty in the British army and navy, is alleged to have been in progress for some time in several garrisons and naval centers, especially in the Aldershot camp, the principal military establishment of southern England. The newspapers say leaflets advocating subversive doctrines have been posted numerously in the neighborhood of camps and barracks and circulated among the soldiers and sailors, but only had the effect of arousing indignation. Several papers today assert that the government has a serious view of the matter and has ordered police to find the promoters of the propaganda. The police over the week-end raided several premises in London, seizing inflammatory pamphlets but making no arrests. It is said that the official Communist party is not responsible for the propaganda, which is believed to be traceable to a small organization liberally supplied with money from an unknown source. The police are investigating reports that a Communist leader, W. Gallacher, in a speech in the Essex market, town of Dunmow, Sunday, urged the workers courageously to carry on intense extremist propaganda in the ranks of the army and navy.

L'Assomption

This Saturday, August 15th, is the Day of the Assumption of the Virgin Mary of the Acadians, and will be celebrated in the Acadian communities in the Maritime Provinces. In this province there will be a picnic at Rustico and a sermon by Rev. Dr. Gauthier. Bloomfield also will have a celebration. It is interesting to recall that the Acadians of the Maritime Provinces, at a meeting held in Miscouche in 1884, adopted this day as their National Day. The National Day of the Canadian French is St. John the Baptist Day, June 24.

Five Daylight Bandits Get \$87,478 In Winnipeg

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Aug. 14.—Five daylight bandits executed one of the boldest coups ever pulled off in Winnipeg when they held up and robbed Dick Shaw, Winnipeg, the Electric Railway Company's cashier at 9:20 this morning. The amount taken was \$87,478. No clue away for the bandits, who had escaped in the company's car, which they later abandoned.

Sir George Perley To Re-enter Politics

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—The return to federal politics of Sir George Perley, former High Commissioner of Canada in London, is a possibility. A petition from the electors of his old county of Argenteuil, signed by over two thousand, has been prepared and those getting it up say that Sir George is expected to accept and become the Conservative candidate. He is on a vacation on the Maine Coast, and his intentions could not be learned.

United States Troops Quell K. K. K. Disorder

READING, Mass., Aug. 14.—After racing over the roads from four different states, a strong force of state troops mobilized here today and stamped out a K. K. K. disorder which threatened to end in bloodshed. Before their arrival tear gas bombs had been hurled, a score of Klansmen and anti-Klansmen had been injured by stones and sticks, shots had been fired and two alleged Klansmen were arrested. The meeting, which began last night, was well advertised, the police said. White-robed Klansmen were not in sight more than half an hour when the outsiders gathered and jeered them. The verbal barrage was followed by one of rocks. According to anti-Klansmen, the gas liberations came after the stones were fired into their midst. Both accused the other of introducing this modern weapon into Klan warfare.

Brewery Changes Hands

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—Announcement was made yesterday that the control of the Frontenac Breweries, Limited, has been taken over by a new group, headed by Donat Raymond, former director of the company. Coincident with this change, an announcement is made by all factors in the brewery industry here of a reversion to the prices which prevailed before the price was inaugurated in March of this year. It is understood that the man heading the Frontenac Company will give up the inclusion of premiums in their capsules for it was this action that precipitated the beer war nearly a half year ago.

Norway Celebrates

(Canadian Press) OSLO, Norway, Aug. 14.—The capital was in gala attire today in celebration of the taking over by Norway of the Svalbard or Spitzbergen Archipelago, which was awarded her by the international treaty signed in Paris, February 9, 1920. Political control of the archipelago, discovered by Norwegians in 1894, was in dispute during the latter part of the last century and ownership was finally decided by the supreme council in Paris after the world war.

Two Women Die In Car Mishaps Wednesday

Both Belong to N. B., Cars Go Over Steep Embankments in Each Case—Inquest Into Deaths

ST. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 14.—Two fatal automobile accidents were reported last night in New Brunswick. One victim was a resident of Saint John and the other was a Bale Verte woman. Three other women were injured in the second accident, and one man was seriously injured. Plunging 55 feet over a cliff to the shore of Bay Chaleur, St. John, Quebec, yesterday afternoon a sedan car owned and driven by Henry A. Mence, St. John, carried to instant death his wife, Hilda, Mence, superintendent of the Prudential Insurance Company, St. John, had several ribs broken. His daughter, Kathleen, aged 15, suffered shock, and his son Harold, aged 12, and Miss Carrie Holly, St. John, escaped with bruises. AMHERST, N. S., Aug. 14.—Miss Lena Turner, Bale Verte, age 43, was instantly killed in a motor accident near Fort Beauséjour this afternoon at 3 o'clock and Mrs. Morley Turner, also of Bale Verte, sustained a broken arm, a fractured skull, and other serious injuries. Mrs. John McGlashing was seriously bruised and cut. Mrs. Charles Silliker was rendered unconscious beside meeting with many severe bruises. John McGlashing, the driver of the car, escaped practically unharmed. Miss Turner was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bliss Turner, of Bale Verte. The entire party belonged to the New Brunswick border village. Mr. and Mrs. McGlashing have been in the United States for the last year. Coroner Calkin, of Sackville, had warrants issued in Amherst for the occupants of the other car, M. S. Levine, John Morison and J. H. McKinnon of Glace Bay. They were arrested and are now being held in Amherst. The car, a light Chevrolet, was touched in passing by another car, and the slight deflection sent it crashing through a fence and into a ravine 40 feet in depth. The car somersaulted and smashed into a heavy stump. Mr. and Mrs. McGlashing, who had arrived in Bale Verte, from the State of Massachusetts, were bringing a party of friends to Amherst. The car was travelling at a very moderate rate of speed when it turned out to permit another car containing M. Levine, John McKinnon and John Morison, all of Inverness, to pass. The road at this particular point is supposed to be narrow and although the Levine car passed safely, Mr. McGlashing, it is understood, cut back into the road before the car had gone by. The two vehicles touched and the slight collision was sufficient to deflect the McGlashing car from the road with unfortunate consequences. Following the accident the occupants of the other car rushed back to the scene and attempted to render first aid, but at the word of Mr. McGlashing, hurried to Amherst and secured medical assistance. Miss Turner had passed away when the doctors arrived but the three other ladies were taken to Highland View Hospital. An inquest will be held in Sackville and Levine, McKinnon and Morison are being detained here as material witnesses. MONCTON, Aug. 14.—Coroner Dr. Calkin of Sackville, was notified of the accident and after viewing the remains, accompanied by Doctors Second and Gas, after enquiring of the details of the accident, decided to hold an inquest and empanelled a jury. No evidence was taken and the court was adjourned until Friday at 2 p.m. It appears that the two cars were proceeding in the same direction, the Glace Bay car passing the other when the accident occurred. The scene of the accident is a dangerous locality and last year a car from the United States with a party of tourists went over into the same ravine, one of the women passengers being seriously injured.

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Belgian Debt Commission Reaching Agreement

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The United States and Belgian debt commissioners are close to a definite agreement for the funding of the Belgian debt of \$480,000,000. It is reliably understood here. Yesterday's sessions at the treasury were to permit the Belgian delegates to communicate with the Brussels Government.

Independent Audit Of N. S. Accounts

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, Aug. 14.—An independent audit of the Nova Scotia public accounts, one of the planks in the Conservative platform during the recent successful election campaign, will be commenced Monday according to an announcement made this afternoon by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Premier of Nova Scotia. The firm of P. S. Ross and Sons, Montreal, will do the work.

Scenes of Auto Fatalities Marked By Crosses

(Associated Press) COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 17.—Dotted the sides of Ohio's highways throughout the length of the state at frequent and infrequent intervals stand white crosses. They mark spots where automobilists have been killed. Automobile drivers rounding a sharp curve, in many sections come squarely upon a white cross, or possibly two or three, mute reminders that one or more persons have been killed at that spot. Governor Vic Donahey was responsible for the placing of the crosses. It was his idea that they would help to cut down automobile fatalities by making drivers more cautious. They have not been installed long enough, however, to draw any conclusions. Many automobile drivers declare they experience a sinking sensation when they see a white cross, and they slow down. The governor has been condemned for the move on the ground it gives rise to morbid thoughts; others have praised it as being a good "sedative" for reckless drivers.

New Chaplin Role

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—Max Reinhardt is contemplating a production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" with Charles Spencer Chaplin, the screen comedian, in the role of Bottom, according to reports from Salzburg. Moris Gest, the American producer, is at Salzburg, reported negotiating with Reinhardt for three productions for New York to be shown in November. At Chaplin's suit in New York, where the comedian is ill, it was said nothing was known concerning this report from Salzburg.
