UNION WITH CANADA.

Is Much Talked of in Newfoundland—Interesting Letter by "Palani."

We left Charlottetown on May 30th, and as we cleared the harbor heard astern the screaming steam-whistles which told us Johannesburg had surrendered. This was our last news for three weeks. It was July 1st before we knew that Pretoria had been captured. This is the most aggravating feature of the cruise, and is particularly exasperating when one considers amid this dearth of news that we are only two hundred miles from the largest cable station in the world.

Truly P. E. I. youth is a most adaptable quantity. Three fourths of our crew are Island boys who have never been to sea before, and to a trained seaman the development of these former lads, some fresh from the plough, is most amazing. The best leadsman we have come from a home-stead in Lot 36, and this green farmer boy is as good a sailor man as any one aboard. The transition is most interesting from a marine standpoint. Captain Tooker and his energetic mate truly work miracles with the most unlikely material. The Dominion Government might do worse than grant a training-vessel subsidy to the Gulnare.

Life is very uneventful and even monotonous up here on the fringe of the Arctic. Letters from home are the only pleasure we know, and we cannot even reckon on that with any certainty. The Newfoundland Government has a delightfully pronounced style of handling the largest coastal mails, which arrive and depart in the most startling and unexpected fashion. Plenty of venison, and salmon reconcile one to a deal monotony, and when the weary days hang most heavily the boys discuss with much glee the pleasure that await them in Charlottetown, and in anticipation enjoy the delights which hinge upon the pay-table in October. "Building castles" is a favorite occupation with the Charlottetown element.

The Gulnare carries to this coast a great quantity of clothing and necessities subscribed for by the various churches in Charlottetown, and I doubt if Charity could possibly have a more deserving object. Both here and in Labrador there is much distress. The natives depend entirely upon the sea for a livelihood and they have learned in the school of bitter experience that she can be a cruelly capricious mistress. We witness the most distressing scenes on these shores, and the patrons of this charity will be pleased to know that the affair is well administered. The natives pull around the vessels in their boats exposing alike their poverty and infirmity. A distribution of clothing is made Captain Taylor acting as High Almoner, and using his experience to prevent the crime of "re-peating" to which these simple people are prone.

The exposure and privation which are the daily lot of the Newfoundlanders have produced a race of hardy seamen absolutely without peers. Even the Eskimaux are no better able to brave the rigors of the Arctic climate. Twenty years ago the late Admiral Colomb approached the British Government and represented the advisability of establishing a Naval Militia in Newfoundland. Such an organization would place at the disposal of the Imperial authorities 25,000 seamen,

but the proposition revived time and again by many experienced officers, has been ignored by the Admiralty which of course is just what might have been expected from that venerable and hide-bound institution.

There is much talk here of a political union with Canada and the present premier Mr. Bond is supposed to favor confederation. This is a country of vast but undeveloped resources. The population of the colony live in small settlements strewn around the coast. For generations the fishery has been their sole industry, and the sea their only highway, which accounts for the neglected condition of the land. Prospectors have found rich deposits of hematite and copper, but they are worked in a casual and promiscuous manner; that is positively heart-breaking to a stranger. Coal of a good quality has been discovered in close proximity to iron, but the energy and capital to establish smelters are apparently lacking. The coast is better provided with harbours than any other country in the world, and there is practically no shipping. Union with Canada would mean an immediate development of the vast potential resources that are here awaiting the advent of capital.

The scenery is rugged and grand and resembles that of the fjords of Norway. There is game in abundance, and the brooks teem with the most gamey and sport inducing fish. Captain Tooker and his two assistants hooked no less than sixty pounds of trout in one short afternoon, the ship's company fore and aft having a fish supper on the proceeds of their skill. Where ever we go the people keep open house for the Gulnare's crew; for though poor these settlers are very hospitable. The crew have I berytranted them as often as possible, and enjoy themselves fishing and gathering spruce gum which is very plentiful in these woods. Mr. Keating our storekeeper has gone to the hospital at St. John's. He has been ailing for some time, but with rest and proper surroundings he expects to recover quite shortly.

We are at anchor in beautiful natural harbor. The virgin forest stretches her arms to the very brink of the bay, whose waters are calm and untroubled as a young girl's brow. In the west King Phoebus is resigning his sceptre, and above the glory of the dying day the lights and shadows of approaching night tell me to end this pen agony that I am inflicting upon you.
