CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS.—Extensive improvements have been made on the New Glasgow, Presbyterian church. The walls and ceilings have been sheathed with British Columbia fir. A commodious vestry and choir loft have been partitioned off at the back of the church with a rear entrance. The church is also to be re-seated with modern seating. The old spire has been replaced by a beautifully designed battlemented tower with octagon buttresses and pinnacles at the corners. There is a bell-deck in the tower with louvred openings at the windows. The eaves and gables have been lengthened and nicely finished. All the sashes have been replaced with new ones and cathedral glass inserted. New concrete steps are being laid at the front entrance. The church has been painted white with brown trimmings. The designing has been done by architect Jas. A. Harris, of Charlottetown, who also supervises the work of the contractors. The Presbyterians of New Glasgow will have a church of which they may well feel proud and which will now afford better opportunity for services. The reopening will likely be held on Sunday, Oct. 29th.

SCHOONER WRECKED.—On Tuesday night the schooner C. A. Chisholm, 78 tons, carrying a cargo of Old Sydney Screened coal and owned by J. Carragher & Co., coal merchants, city was dismasted during the stormy weather at Point Prim and was driven ashore and wrecked in the vicinity of Tweedy's Reef, Orwell Bay. All the crew were safely landed. The cargo is insured, but not the vessel. Both will be sold in auction by Hyndman & Co., Lloyd's agents, at China Point Wharf next Saturday at 2 p.m.

The Provision Market

Live Hog Prices 25c to 31.25 Lower for Week.

A weaker feeling has prevailed in the Canadian live hog situation during the past week and prices generally at all the leading centres have scored declines which was attributed to the increased supplies coming forward and the fact that packers maintain present values are unprofitable, and especially so since prices for Canadian bacon have been much reduced in the English markets. At Toronto last week prices closed 50c to 75c per 100 lbs., lower than the previous week at 31c per 100 lbs. for select fed and watered, while at Winnipeg they declined \$1 to \$1.25 per 100 lbs., with the latest sales of select at \$9.50, and at Calgary they sold 25c per 100 lbs. off at \$9.25. The bulk of the offerings on the Montreal market sold at \$11.75 to \$12 per 100 lbs., weighed off cars for selected lots.

There was no important change in the condition of the local market for smoked and cured meats, prices being fairly steady throughout the week under a good demand for supplies, and an active trade was done for the season of the year. Sales of 8 to 12 lb. hams were made at 25c to 30c per lb., heavy weights at 23c and 24c per lb.; cooked flat hams at 40c per lb., and cooked hams at 37c per lb., while smoked breakfast bacon sold at 32c per lb. The trade in trimmed loins of fresh pork was good at 27c per lb., and trimmed shoulders at 18c per lb.

The market for lard was fairly active, and as supplies were not excessive prices were maintained with sales of Canadian refined grades at 18c per lb. in 1-lb. blocks and at 16c per lb. in 20 lb. wood pallets. The receipts of provisions on Saturday were 1,317 packages large, 1,228 boxes hams and bacon, and 1,169 packages meats.

British Rail says Lower Fare Rates

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The eagerly awaited announcement of the lowering of railway fares which were raised 75 per cent. during the war was made tonight. The railway companies of Great Britain have agreed to bring this increase down to fifty per cent. Rates for perishable traffic on passenger trains are being made subject to the same reduction. Henceforth the practice of some companies of charging less than double fare for the return journey will be generally terminated. Third class fare under the new decision will work out at three half pence per mile. Tourist and excursion fares are to be reduced proportionately to ordinary fares, but season tickets will not be affected as they are now only five per cent. above the pre war rate. Workmen's fares are also unaffected.

A RUNAWAY PERAMBULATOR

A runaway perambulator caused the death of a baby boy at Dalton, England, recently.

It had been left for a moment outside a barber's shop by the mother, while she went to attend to her other child whose hair was being cut.

In her absence, the perambulator owing to the wind, ran to the kerb and overturned. The baby was thrown out at the moment when a horse-drawn van was passing.

A wheel of the vehicle passed over the child's head, killing him instantly.

Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of Telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

General.

Taken as a whole the present year is one of the best that Canada has ever experienced as regards the quantity and quality of the crops in the Prairie Provinces. The yield of wheat is estimated to be close upon 350,000,000 bushels, or more than last year, and yields of other grains are proportionately greater. Most of the grain is grading high. The province of Ontario probably never had a more splendid all around crop than this year. The average has been considerably exceeded in practically every class of agricultural produce. Heavy crops have also been garnered in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. In the Columbia suffered from drought in the early part of the season, an unusual condition, which cut the yields to below average.

Prairie Provinces.

Owing to the early harvest 7,000,000 bushels of new wheat were marketed in August, and a further 95,000,000 in September, an unusually large movement with which the railways coped in an excellent manner. During the first two weeks of September threshing was delayed by rain, but owing to cool weather there was little damage from sprouting. Wheat is grading high, the bulk of the receipts running Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Northern. The yield of wheat is estimated to run from 350,000,000 to 380,000,000 bushels, as compared with 280,000,000 bushels last year. Oats 400,000,000 bushels compared with 335,000,000. Barley 550,000,000 bushels as compared with 44,000,000.

Province of Quebec.

The province's principal crop that of hay, proved unusually heavy and of excellent quality. Cereal crops throughout the province have been harvested in good condition, the yields highly satisfactory. Roots are not quite so good as previously expected and some rot has appeared in potatoes which are barely an average crop. Most districts report a good supply of feed. So far as yields of crops are concerned the present year has been one of the best for some time.

Province of Ontario.

The yields of grain show an estimated average of 43% over last year. Fall wheat is estimated at 12,250,000 bushels, last year 23,450,000. Spring wheat 2,300,000 bushels, last year 1,900,000. Barley and rye 16,875,000 bushels, last year 11,825,000. Oats 122,150,000.
