MADE-IN-GERMANY BOGEY

LONDON, Dec. 1.—In view of the prevalent impression in England that the British Markets are flooded with goods "Made in Germany," it is interesting to note the statement appended to the bills regulating the commercial relations of the two countries just framed by the German Federal council.

The statement shows that Germany's trade with England and the British colonies far exceeds her trade with any other country, and that Germany's imports from England exceed her exports to England in an ever-increasing degree.

In 1909 the differences was \$62,500,000; in 1910, \$70,000,000; in 1911, nearly \$92,500,000 and in 1912, \$122,500,000.
