THE EXAMINER'S POSITION.

The Daily Examiner yesterday discussed at some length its attitude towards the Dominion Packing Company, concluding its article as follows:

The Examiner is, therefore, determinedly opposed to the guarantee, while it is, and always has been, disposed to entertain favorably the company's request for exemption from city taxes.

We note that The Guardian insinuates that THE EXAMINER also has received some inducements to this latter course. We deny the imputation and challenge The Guardian to the proof of that which it insinuates but does not dare to state.

There is no need for any heat or excitement in the matter, and the Examiner betrays both. Here is precisely what The Guardian said and is prepared to stand by:

The Examiner, which some months ago held different ground, has now apparently become a convert to the Packing Company's interest. No explanation of this change of attitude is offered, and the citizens are left to guess the reason.

The change of attitude is patent to all and at the time our article was written the facts were precisely as we stated them. The Examiner had changed its attitude and had apparently become a convert to the Packing Company's interest. No explanation for the change had been offered.

Yesterday, after our article had appeared, it offered a partial and rather feeble explanation of the substance of which is quoted above. We simply stated some facts. We left our readers to guess the reason for the change in the Examiner's attitude. Among so numerous a class there would doubtless be many and different guesses. There is absolutely nothing that we wish to state which we dare not state. The Examiner speaks of "inducements" which it says we insinuated it has received. We had no such thought until we read its issue of yesterday. "Suspicion haunts the guilty mind," and The Examiner is evidently suspicious, else it would not have given to our words a meaning, which as plain English they do not bear.

A COMMITTEE APPOINTED.

There was no small stir in the Legislature yesterday over a vague statement made by Hon. Mr. Whear followed by a resolution to appoint a special committee to investigate certain alleged charges made in The Guardian. A committee of

five was appointed accordingly with power to summon and examine witnesses under oath and to send for persons, papers and documents. We sincerely hope and trust that the investigation may be public and that all the facts of this case may be brought to light without concealment or evasion. Otherwise the entire proceeding will look merely like a piece of bluff, or a last resort to save the Packing Company's bill. Whether it will have that effect remains to be seen. We have strongly objected to the Packing Company's methods, in their efforts to secure what we consider unfair advantages through the City Council and the Legislature. We have yet to learn why we should not be free to do so.

But if this Company is to be regarded as a thing too sacred for fair newspaper discussion; if its methods are to be held altogether above criticism; if they have a divine right to guarantees, bonuses and exemptions denied to others, and if all men are to be estopped from making objection, then the sooner the people are made aware of the fact the better. We do not think we have yet reached that stage in Prince Edward Island. That such conditions would suit some interested parties we can well believe, but neither the people nor the Legislature are yet prepared to enact a gag law nor to suppress free discussion. Let the Packing Company and its proposals stand on their merits. With a Government and two daily newspapers committed to their interests the public need have no fear that the Company will suffer wrongfully.
