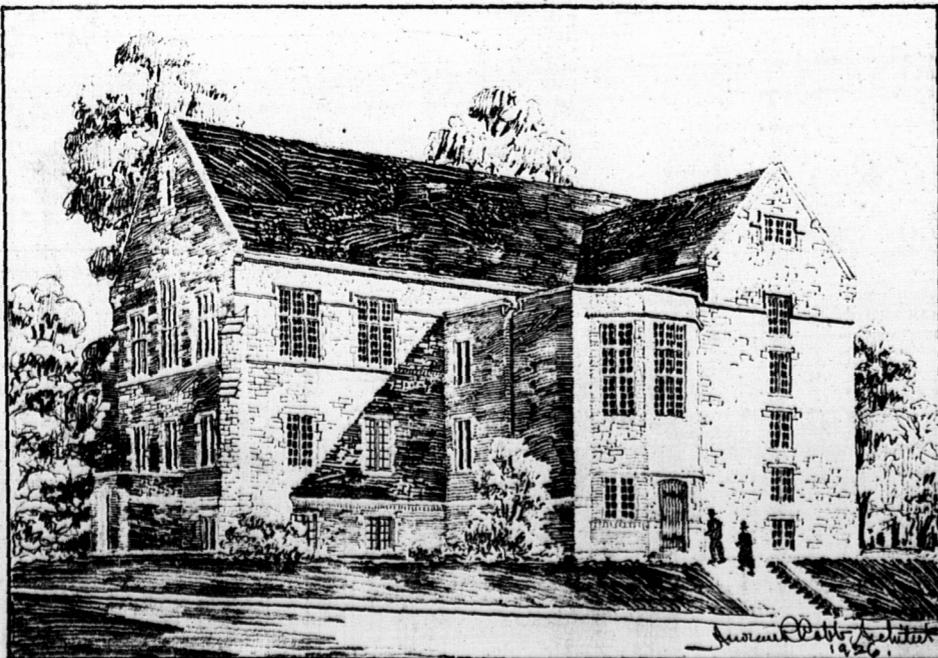


## What Picture Folks Do With Old Clothes

### WIRELESS TICKET SERVICE ON GERMAN TRAINS

An interesting new feature has been added to the German train telephone service. According to an announcement to the German Railroad Information Office in New York, passengers on trains equipped with radio telephones, can now receive complete market reports from all German and foreign stock exchanges. These reports reach the travelling banker as promptly as if he were in his own, or his brokers office, and the radio telephone service enables him to give his buying or selling orders while still in route. The German Railroads also announce that experiments with automatic devices for stopping trains that run past stop signals, have proven so successful on the electrified lines that the main suburban line, running out of Berlin, is now being equipped with the new safety system. The work will continue until all the other electrified lines have been similarly equipped. The appliance automatically cuts off the current and applies the brakes the moment the train runs into the closed block. Trains going more than 42 miles an hour were brought to a standstill within about 700 feet.
