Montreal Exchange MONTREAL STOCK EXCHANGE

MONTREAL, June 9—(CP)—Gains scored a grand slam in the averages today on the stock exchange and curb market. All groups moved up as a result of the buoyant trading trends.

Brazilian was a high spot in transactions on the stock exchange, registering its best price since April, 1940. Montreal Power and International Power were other firm utilities. C.P.R. and Canada Steamship got rises in carriers.

Paper stocks were generally pointed upward, fractional lifts going to Price Brothers and the St. Lawrence Corporation issues. St. Lawrence Paper preferred was an exception. Also improved among industrial were Steel of Canada, Canadian Car preferred, General Steel Wares and Cosco "B."

Noranda was in arrears in pivotal metals and Consolidated Smelters a winner. Imperial and International Petroleum both did better in oils.

Celanese was another strong spot, pushing up to a new high. Harder in miscellaneous as well were Distillers-Searsons and Wabasso. Canadian Foreign Investment worked lower.

Total sales: 22,200 shares; Industrials, 10,000; Mines 12,100.

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, June 9—(CP)—Industrial stocks nosed out for first place over the golds in the action today on the Toronto stock exchange. Having rested up over the holiday, the market was prepared for another advance and both mining groups and industrials were strong from the opening. Industrials finished 1.45 up in the index, golds added 1.01 and base metals 30 while western oils were down .08.

Volume was the heaviest since last December at 254,000 shares.

Gains in the industrial section widened to a point or more and groups closing on the upside included the utilities, steels, foods, senior oils, papers, liquors and banks.

Most of the secondary and junior golds were strong and the seniors steady while base metals were a bit softer towards the close.

Western oils were dull and mainly unchanged.

Finance

NEW YORK, June 9—(AP)—The lengthy stock market rally inspired enough profit taking today to stem the rising tide in the New York stock exchange.

The Associated Press composite of 60 stocks was off .2 of a point at 36.1, first set-back in this barometer since the strong upswing got under way last Wednesday. Active dealings in the morning tapered off later but transfers totalled 397,680 shares against 355,690 Monday.

Eastman Kodak up 3-4 points yesterday largely on account of nervous stock covering, retreated 3-8 today. Lesser casualties included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors (which made a new year's high in the forenoon) Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, J. I. Case, International Harvester, Boeing, United Aircraft, Anaconda, Westinghouse, General Electric, Johns-Manville, U.S. Gypsum, Standard Oil (N.D.).

Grain

WINNIPEG, June 9—(CP)—July wheat closed unchanged today at 89 3-8 after a dull session on Winnipeg grain exchange.

No export business in wheat or flour was confirmed. Locals and mills took 300,000 bushels out of the pit.

In the coarse grain pit routine trades in oats and barley and intermarket operations in rye formed the bulk of the business.

FINED \$30 AND COSTS FOR INCREASING RENT

MONTREAL, June 8. — Napoleon fined \$30 and costs, or one month, when he pleaded guilty before Judge F. T. Enright yesterday to a charge of having violated Wartime Prices and Trade Board Regulations by increasing the rental of premises at 3701 Hutchison from January 1 and May 6.

Evidence indicated that Jean Lamoureux, tenant, during the basic period chosen by the Board to fix its maximum, had paid \$21 per month, and that the landlord had sought to have the new tenant, William Fahy, pay \$25. Fahy refused, even in the face of threatened eviction.

Belanger said he had increased the rental because of repairs which had cost him \$100 but it was pointed out to him that he had not obtained permission to do so from the Board.

MONTREAL, June 9—(CP)—There were 164 cattle, 62 sheep and lambs, 742 hogs and 1,140 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. Hogs and calves were strong, other kinds of livestock were steady.

There were no good steers. Common to medium steers brought \$9 to \$11. Good cows \$9.25 to \$10, medium \$8 to \$9.50 and common butchers \$7 to \$8. Canners and cutters \$5 to \$6.75. Good bulls \$9.25 to \$10.50 and common down to \$7.

Veal calves ranged from \$10 to \$14. Good veals \$13.50 up, medium mostly \$12.50 to \$13. The bulk of the veals sold between \$11 and \$12.

Drinks \$8 to \$9.50.

Spring lambs were sold at \$5 to \$9 each according to weight and quality. Common light lambs are not wanted. Sheep were \$6 to \$8.

Hogs were \$15.75 for B-1 dressed with an odd small sale to local butchers up to \$16. Grade A dress cuts on off grade, bows were \$9.50 to \$10.50 live weight.
