TELLING TIME WITH A COMPASS.

It is commonly known that points of the compass can be determined by the use of a watch. By pointing the hour hand toward the sun a bearing halfway between the hour hand and 12 o'clock "on the watch is true south" It is not generally known that time can be told by the compass with equal facility. Take the true azimuth of bearing of the sun and subtract from it 180 degrees; multiply the remainder by the fraction 1-15, and the result will be the hour before or after 1 o'clock noon. — Engineering and Mining Journal.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along a public road, for \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years and cultivation of the land. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$3.00. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

GLIMPSES OF Y. M. C. A. FOR THE SOLDIERS AT THE FRONT

One hundred thousand magazines were collected in one day in Toronto and will be forwarded by the Military Department to the Canadian soldiers at the front. The collection was arranged by Capt. Forgie for the National Council of the Y. M. C. A. of Canada. It is planned by the Y. M. C. A. to gather together and forward huge bundles of these magazines every couple of months, as the soldiers are eager for such entertainment.

CHRISTMAS GIFTS FROM THE TRENCHES

The cabled news item sent out before Christmas that millions of pounds of plum pudding had left England for the soldiers of Britain and the rest of the Empire, caused surprise only from the big figures involved. The Y. M. C. A. workers helped to reverse the process—in gifts "from" the trenches. Here is what Capt. Hancock, one of the Canadian Association men overseas, writes from firing line: "Our men were paid extra Christmas money and my C.O. wanted to know what could be done in the way of supplying Christmas presents that the boys could send home to Canada. I got a few thousand francs together and took my horse and groom, with packs, and made to the nearest large center and purchased a generous supply of souvenirs, jewelry, handkerchiefs, etc.

The way the boys went after those things was amazing. They lasted just one day. Again I made a trip and got more, and still again, each time bringing back as much as we could carry. The men took it all and would have used more.

Further, each man was supplied with a card on which he sent his Christmas greetings with the article he chose. The goods were packed and registered and mailed right from the Y. M. C. A. Hundreds of men sent these messages of love home, which would have been impossible but for the Association. Alas, for some it has already proved to be their last."
