Search Is Continued

BULAWAYO, Southern Rhodesia, March 3—Five aeroplanes from the Union of South Africa joined the search today for Lady Young, wife of the Governor of Rhodesia, missing since Thursday with Dr. J. Kerby when his aeroplane was forced down in the bush country. Four other planes were already in the hunt, while 200 native troops and 170 railway employees were beating the bush 10 to 15 miles from the railway line between Monze and Masubuka, Northern Rhodesia, under the direction of her husband, Sir Hubert Young.

Pope Canonizes Martyrs

VATICAN CITY, March 3—With imposing ecclesiastical ceremony the canonization of the blessed Sir Thomas More and the blessed John Cardinal Fisher, martyrs under King Henry VIII of England, was decreed today in the presence of Pope Pius XI. Both the Cardinal and the Lord Chancellor were put to death for refusing to acknowledge Henry VIII as head of the church.

IS RECOVERING FROM ATTACK OF INFLUENZA

Premier Not In Serious Condition, But Will Require Rest For Week or Two.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

OTTAWA, March 3—Political activities in the Capital have been overcast in the past week by the illness of Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and the uncertainty as to when he will be able to return to his parliamentary and administrative duties. It is understood Mr. Bennett will be out this week, possibly tomorrow, but he will probably have to take a week or two in which to fully get back his strength. He is expected to go to some southern resort, although he will probably spend a few days in the House before leaving.

Stricken by influenza a week ago, Mr. Bennett was found by his physicians to be very much run down from overwork. It is understood his condition was not serious but might become so if he attempted to maintain the pace he had set for himself since the first of the year.

Handles Reform Legislation

Much of the reform legislation now before the House and to be introduced, is being handled personally by the Prime Minister. Measures which were to have been presented by him this week include the eight-hour day and weekly day of rest bills, and the resolution to set up a Dominion grain board. Other bills that may be delayed by Mr. Bennett's indisposition include those concerning establishment of a department of communications, creation of an economic council, and amendments to the Old Age Pensions Act.

Unemployment Relief

In a few weeks the matter of unemployment relief will again be very much to the forefront. Existing agreements with the provinces, under which the Dominion pays each a "grant in aid" in monthly instalments, will expire on March 31. No indications have been given as to what new arrangements will be effected and Minister of Labor W. A. Gordon told the House a few days ago that no concrete plans or requests for further assistance had come from the provinces.

Quiet Week

Last week was quiet in the House of Commons. Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes made considerable progress with his measures amending the Farm Loans Act and the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act of last year. The former places the Canada Loan Board exclusively within the jurisdiction of the Dominion Government and does away with the necessity of provincial enabling legislation. It also widens the lending and scope of the Act.

Progress was made also with estimates, with the early part of the week devoted to concluding the debate on Hon. Ian MacKenzie's want of confidence motion. This was defeated with a solid government vote with the Progressive group, except A. M. Carmichael (Kingston) joining the Liberals to support it.

LONDON, March 3—The dispatch of notes by the British Government to Tokyo, Paris and Washington suggesting an international loan to China was unofficially ascribed today to increasing fears in financial circles here of an impending economic collapse in China.

The fear that Sino-Japanese economic collaboration, under discussion at Nanking for several weeks, might seriously curtail British, United States and French trade interests in China also was understood to be one reason for the notes, which were sent yesterday.

THREE DEAD IN CAR ACCIDENTS

GALT, Ont., March 3—Two young Toronto women and a 15-year-old girl of Dundas, Ont., were killed in two traffic accidents near here Saturday night. One motorist was held on a charge of manslaughter.

Dead are: Miss Norma M. Rodden, 23, Miss Barbara Hunter, 21, both from Toronto, and Miss Mabel Sharpe, 15, of Dundas.

Arcile Fogelman, Galt, whose auto is alleged to have struck Mabel Sharpe as she was walking with her cousin on the Preston highway, was arrested on a charge of manslaughter.

The two Toronto young women lost their lives when the automobile in which they were returning from a basketball game in Galt crashed against a truck stopped on the Hamilton highway between Rockton and Sheffield. Two young men with them incurred minor head injuries.

Fred Carter, driver of the auto, taken to a hospital, was ordered to be detained there by the police, pending investigation. Donald A. Smith also of Toronto, a passenger, was released from the hospital today.

Holmes Weaker, Says Doctor

WASHINGTON, March 3—Oliver Wendell Holmes, aged former justice of the United States Supreme Court, was said to be growing weaker today by his physician, Dr. Thomas A. Clayton.

Mark Howe, former secretary to the 93-year-old jurist who has been at the residence almost constantly since Holmes was stricken with bronchial pneumonia, said: "Mr. Holmes is conscious and he is not suffering. I do not believe that he is receiving stimulants."

King Of Siam Abdicates; No Successor Declared

ORANIEIGH, Eng., March 3—Prasitipok of Siam, ruler until today of 10,000,000 people, has abdicated the throne without designating a successor and retired to private life as plain Prince Sukhodaya.

Three simple sentences—"It's all over. The King is no more. He has abdicated."—informed the world that the diminutive, brown-skinned monarch had stepped down, bringing to an end months of wrangling with the home government over his royal prerogatives.

He signed the abdication document Saturday afternoon at his temporary country residence at Knowle. The announcement by his private secretary, M. R. Smakman, was delivered this afternoon in a small sitting room cluttered with books and the King's hunting guns, followed a couple of hours later by the King's first interview since coming to Britain on his present trip.

Although the document of abdication mentioned no successor to the throne, the name of Prince Ananda, 11-year-old Siamese schoolboy now at Lausanne, Switzerland, has been mentioned as possible successor. The secretary explained there was no necessity for specifying the successor since this is provided in certain Siamese laws.

LINER LOSES TWO OF CREW IN CROSSING

Crippled Montclare Enters Halifax Harbour, Testifying To Furious Seas Encountered.

HALIFAX, March 3—Battered by mountainous seas that drowned one of her crew, killed another and injured two more, the Canadian Pacific liner Montclare steamed into Halifax harbor today with her flag at half-mast.

Broken bulwarks, a twisted derrick and shattered windows were stars of the "1,000-ton vessel's" battle with the Atlantic during one of the worst crossings within the memory of her oldest seaman.

One great wave that broke clear over the Montclare caused most of the damage and the death of her son's mate Hugh Owens and seaman William Kirby, both of Liverpool, Eng.

Lifted from the deck as the wave struck, Kirby was swept over the side into the furious sea. At the same time Owens was dashed against the steel bulwark, whose head was crushed. He was dead when the ship's doctor reached his side.

Rushed to Hospital

Injured by the same wave, seamen Joseph Richmond and William Jones were rushed to hospital in an ambulance as soon as the liner docked today. Jones' right leg and arm were broken and amputation of the leg was found necessary, while Richmond had several broken ribs and it was feared one had punctured a lung.

Bound for Halifax from Glasgow and Liverpool, the Montclare ran into the storm Tuesday morning. The sea was heavy and the liner was making her way slowly when deck officers had warning of the disastrous tower of water ahead. At first they thought it would strike the starboard side but it swerved furiously and crashed on the port side, sending tons of water over the bridge and forward deck.

Windows Shattered

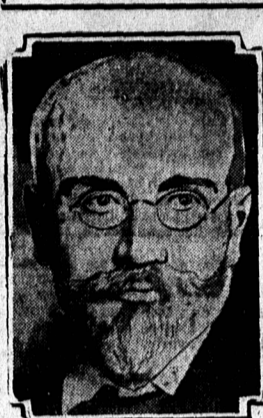
Some of the water that rolled over the bridge found its way down into the third-class quarters. Windows 3-4 of an inch thick were shattered, and the ceiling of the deck below torn open and the steel bulwarks and derrick were twisted by the terrific force of the wave.

Only a few passengers were on deck at the time and no injuries were reported by them.

Seaman Kirby was never seen again after he was swept overboard. No lifeboat could have lived on that sea, the ship's officers said, and to have put one out would have been merely sending other men to death.

OVER \$30,000 RANSOM MONEY STILL MISSING

Authorities Speculate On Probable Disposition of Currency In Lindbergh Kidnap-Murder Case.

NEW YORK, March 3—The ransom phase of the Lindbergh case remains tonight three years and two days after the actual kidnaping of the child, only "two-fifths solved."

Of the \$50,000 paid by Col. Charles A. Lindbergh to a ransom collector in a Bronx cemetery April 2, 1932, only \$19,716 has been accounted for.

Unaccounted For

Police Probe SLAYINGS

NEW YORK, March 3—Three slayings today, all of which police linked with the lucrative policy game, gambling, dope or vice racket, made a dramatic prelude to a sweeping grand jury investigation beginning tomorrow.

John ("Spook") Marzita, 36, described by police as a policy racketeer, was shot and killed by two gunmen as he walked from a Brooklyn hotel with a woman friend.

The body of a reputed drug peddler with two gunshot wounds in the head and a third in his arm was found on the roof of a building on 106th street, by a tenant. Police identified the body as Salvatore Natoli, 24, Natoli, officers said, was definitely known as a drug peddler and probably was mixed up in the Harlem policy racket.

Solly Jacobow, 37, a taxi driver, was killed as he sat at the wheel of his cab. A man who gave his name as Angelo Bempensato, 27, was arrested after a pursuit by officers and held on a homicide charge in connection with the case. Bempensato owns a number of "push ball" machines on the type which sometimes are used for gambling.

Toronto Theatre Owner Found Dead In His Office

TORONTO, March 3—Shot twice through the head, the body of Abraham Appleby, proprietor of the theatre in the city, on Queen Street West, in the immediate vicinity of Toronto's Chinatown.

His body was found by Roy Wong Young, member of the Chinese Free Masons, who were presenting a play in the theatre today. Wong went upstairs to the office on the second floor, but received no answer to his knocks on the door.

Murray Levitovitch, a son-in-law of the murdered man, uneasy at Appleby's prolonged absence from home, called at the office about the same time. The Chinese smashed the glass of the door, and Levitovitch helped him climb through.

After authorities had reached the scene, Dr. Thomas Belt, pathologist of the Toronto General Hospital, removed the two bullets from Appleby's skull. They were badly mushroomed, but a tentative examination indicated to the police that they might be of different calibres. The possibility suggested that there was more than one gunman.

In Appleby's pockets were almost \$50 in cash, which the slayer had overlooked. A fingerprint expert made a careful examination of the office for tell-tale marks.

Island Of Crete Under Control Of Rebel Forces

Government Calls Out Naval Reserves — Former Premier Joins Forces Of Revolutionists.

ATHENS, March 3—The Greek government bombed the home in Crete of former Premier Eleutherios Venizelos tonight in a grim effort to stamp out a fast-growing revolt which had spread to Thrace and Macedonia on the mainland.

Bombs from aeroplanes and machine guns were turned on the residence at Canea of the 71-year-old rebel leader and "grand old man" of Greek politics, but meagre reports did not disclose whether he was home at the time.

Government planes, after raining bombs upon warships seized Friday night by rebels in the navy, flew to Athens tonight for more munitions and returned to Mitylene Crete to continue the bombardment.

FINANCES REVOLTS

Crete was in the hands of the revolutionists. Venizelos was said to have seized \$1,000,000 from Canea's treasury to finance the revolt.

As the harassed government called out naval reserves, reports came that the rebellion had reached Alexandropolis and other towns in Thrace, in the northeastern corner of Greece, between Macedonia and Turkey.

Information that Seres, Eastern Macedonia, had been recaptured from the rebels indicated the uprising was more extensive than at first believed. This was the first news of disturbances in that section.

Planes Attack Rebel Ships

Loyal aeroplanes struck again at the five naval vessels manned by rebels, standing off the shores of Crete.

The resignation of Foreign Minister D. Maximos, the arrest of the Governor General of Crete and the resignation of three other cabinet members announced yesterday combined to force the government to call the naval class of 1932 to the colors, and to prepare for calling out army classes on the mainland if necessary.

Former Premier Eleutherios Venizelos openly joined the forces of rebellion in Crete, where he lives, becoming the spearhead of an anti-government movement which appeared to be becoming more serious hourly.

Athens Quiet

Athens was quiet, although under martial law and in a state of siege. Following direct censorship, the government suspended some sections of the constitution. These were not specified.

The government announced aircraft had located the five ships which they pursued yesterday in fighting the Aegean Sea, overtaking the cruiser Aceroff and scoring a direct hit with a serial bomb while the vessel lay in Souda Bay, near Canea, Crete.

Watchers from the shore, according to reports reaching here, said a huge column of smoke arose from the ship after the bomb struck, leading to the belief she may be put out of action.

Unconfirmed reports telling of the arrival of five ships in Crete said three of them were severely damaged.

Search Homes

The government searched the Athens home of former Premier Venizelos, the 71-year-old "Grand Old Man" of Greek politics twice during the day and reported finding arms and compromising literature.

General George Kondylis, Minister of War, personally headed the search at Venizelos' home where they found deputy Papanastasiu, recently an opposition spokesman, and another Venizelos associate.

Cease Search For Missionaries

SIAM, Siam, Province, China, March 3—The China Inland Mission revealed today that hope had been virtually abandoned for both Rev. B. C. Frenchan, Australian mission worker, and his London wife who are feared to have fallen into the hands of Red bandits.

The mission received a telegram from Pongshien today indicating two British missionaries who set out to search for Mrs. Frenchan in the mountains of this province have abandoned the hunt.

SHANGHAI, Hunan Province, China, March 3—At the request of the China Inland Mission the British Consul here renewed his efforts today to sift conflicting reports concerning the fate of R. A. Bosshart and A. Hayman, who refugees insisted had been tortured and murdered. The two are British missionaries.

The consul launched a new inquiry into the fate of the two men. They were captured by bandits last October.
