

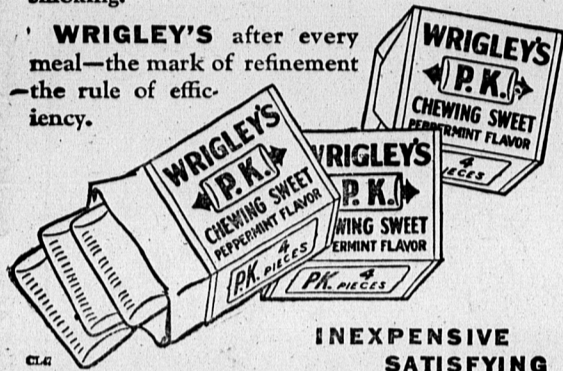

—BISHOP O'SULLIVAN CONFIRMS.—Bishop O'Sullivan paid his official visit to Bloomfield on Wednesday last. In the morning at 7 a. m. in the parish church of St. Anthony, His Lordship confirmed a class of 98 children, this is the largest class on the island with the exception of Charlottetown. Large congregations attended the services on Tuesday evening. Addresses of welcome were read, both in English and French, on behalf of the congregation. An address was also read by the altar boys. His Lordship preached an inspiring sermon to the congregation. He also addressed the altar boys and gave an interesting sketch of his early education. The visiting priests were Rev. Father McMahon, Rev. Wm. McCabe and Rev. J. A. McDonald. The magnificent marble altar was decorated with lovely flowers. The church too had a profusion of lovely blossoms. In the afternoon, the Bishop and his party motored to Alberton, where confirmation was held. A reception was given in his honor on Wednesday.—S.

Campbell Scored For Lax Law Enforcement Under His Department

Attorney General's Responsibility For Farical Prohibition Enforcement And Violation Of Election Pledges Emphasized At Elmsdale Meeting Where Conservative Candidates Are Enthusiastically Received.

The joint political meeting at Elmsdale held on Wednesday was a rousing one. Mr. Wilfred Tanton, the Conservative candidate, scoring heartily over his opponent, Mr. Thane A. Campbell, Attorney-General when he showed up his tax methods of administering the laws of the Province.

Mr. Joseph Dunbar, of Alma, was the chairman and acted very impartially towards all speakers. The speakers in order named were Messrs. Thane A. Campbell, (Lib.), Wilfred Tanton, (Con.), Aeneas Gallant, (Lib.), and J. J. Chaisson, (Con.)

Mr. Campbell spent half of his time defending the Lea-Saunders Prohibition enforcement and its road-making activities. He had a good deal to say on the finance and interest on debt.

Mr. Wilfred Tanton followed, and took Mr. Campbell to task for the non-enforcement, not only of the Prohibition law, but of all laws in the Province. The lax methods of the Department of Justice were un-

mercifully exposed by Mr. Tanton. He cited a recent case in Charlottetown, where a man, after his 14th offense, had been given a sentence of nine months. He was arrested and put in jail but boasted that he would be out in three days. All that he had been given a jail sentence and not a fine, he paid \$300 towards the Liberal campaign and was let out of jail. Mr. Tanton stated he was ready to back up his statement if they appointed a Royal Commission to prove this.

Mr. Tanton, to prove how low the law in this Province has become, recalled a case last winter in Summerside, where the Attorney General, the candidate now coming before the electorate of 1st Prince, neglected to prosecute a man who had stolen a valuable fox pelt and committed forgery, and the Attorney General receives a salary of \$1,500 a year to look after this department. There are scores of such cases that could be brought to the knowledge of the public. All this is

in fact, Mr. N. W. Lowther for the defendant.
