PARLIAMENT PROROGUED.

At the end of its second session the tenth Parliament of Canada was prorogued yesterday. The country will breathe a little more freely from that fact. Never yet in this country has a Parliament been so much distrusted by the people who elected it and at no time is it feared so much as in the last days of its sitting. It was in the last days of the session of 1905 that the salary grab was consummated.

That entire session was a conspiracy of both parties against the people of Canada. By the nefarious device of the round robin, a device as discreditable as the loaded dice of the gambler, the game was played in secret through the entire session until all was ready and at the close the gamblers had only to divide the spoil and announce the results. This was done with an audacity and a disregard of the popular will that has had no parallel in Canadian history.

There were three features to the general scheme, but one main objective point. The increased salaries to Judges and the pensions to Ex-Ministers were only the outworks to strengthen the main position by which Members and Senators would each grab \$1000 more for himself. It was foreseen that the country would strongly resent the outrage, and so the way was prepared for a small concession. That concession has now been made by the repeal of the pensions in order to cover the retention of the increased indemnity.

Everything goes to show how reluctantly the small concession is made. Hon. Mr. Fielding in the Commons and Hon. Mr. Scott in the Senate have intimated that the repeal is made only because of hostile public opinion, and that it is their intention to restore the pensions in modified form at an early day. It was a matter of doubt down to the last day of the session whether even in this doubtful fashion the repeal bill would go through the Senate. At the last moment it passed, as a temporary measure, in the hope of saving to members of the two Houses their ill-gotten salary grab.

And so the situation stands. The members of the Commons and Senate, not one half of whom ever honestly earned \$2,500 a year in all their lives, will pay themselves that sum for each session they attend at Ottawa, and there is to be another session this year! The men in power spent years in opposition denouncing the extravagance of Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper. In those days the pay of members and senators was \$1,000. It is now \$2,500. And the entire expenditure of the country was then but half what it is today.

Judged by all the principles they laid down and all the standards they set up when in Opposition what must be the verdict of an intelligent people as to the present Government and the present Parliament? We leave it to our readers to decide. In the carnival of expenditure tens of millions have been flung away, and the paralysed Opposition under a leader who by special grace enjoys a ministerial salary, and with their share of the divided spoil in their pockets, offer only the most feeble protest. It is only too true that in the worst features of the extravagance of the past two sessions the Opposition has joined with the ministerial party to divide the spoil.

It is such conditions, which have had no parallel in Canadian history, that give a sense of relief when prorogation is announced. For a brief time the riot is over and the country breathes more freely. But the distrust of the people is too deep-seated to be easily set at rest or removed. What the tenth Parliament will yet do before its term expires is a matter of very serious apprehension.

Apparently Dryfus will not only be declared innocent by the Supreme Court of France, but will also be restored to his forfeited position and honor. This will be but a partial atonement for the disgrace, banishment and intolerable sufferings of eight years past. He refuses to accept the monetary damages to which under the laws of France he is entitled.

As a result of its fine climate and the stimulus of high prices on the coast, British Columbia is coming to the front as a fruit-growing Province. Dominion Fruit Inspector Maxwell Smith estimates that last year's production of apples, peaches, plums, strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, gooseberries, cherries, and currants yielded nearly a million dollars. The acreage devoted to fruit in 1904 was 14,000 acres, and last year was increased to 20,000 acres. Our own Province has great possibilities of development along the same time.

Premier Goin is to be congratulated on his surplus of \$150,000, even though it may not greatly strengthen the claim of his Province for an increased subsidy.

Right Hon. David Lloyd George, President of the Board of Trade in the imperial Cabinet, has publicly declared that the House of Lords ought to be sent to the scrapheap as so much worn-out parliamentary machinery. And yet relatively the House of Lords has much more weight and much more good to its credit than the Canadian Senate.

A correspondent writes complaining of a double rate being charged on freight being sent unpaid to way stations. It is, we believe the rule of all railways that freight from way stations shall be prepaid, and this for the obvious reason that the railway has no agent at such stations to collect. If this rule were observed, as it ought to be there would be no cause for complaint.

An effort is to be made to bring British immigrants to Prince Edward Island to buy and operate the improved farms here. In pursuance of this plan Bursar Anthony McLaughlin of the Falconwood Hospital, has been appointed Immigration Agent, and will devote the next two months to procuring information, after which he will proceed to the Old Country. Pamphlets giving necessary information will be prepared by Mr Warburton, K. C. We regard the plan as a good one. There are thousands of tenant farmers with fair capital in England, Scotland and Ireland who could greatly improve their circumstances by purchasing improved farms in this Province. At the same time their settlement in our midst, supplying the place of those who have gone away, would be of incalculable benefit to the Island.
