New England Apple Crop is Below Average

BOSTON, Nov. 26.—The New England commercial apple crop is expected to fall considerably below that of last year and more than 400,000 barrels below the average for the past five years, according to forecasts issued by the New England Crop Reporting Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The forecast for this year is 1,475,000 barrels, as compared to 1,635,000 barrels harvested last year and the five year average of 1,922,400 barrels.

Production by the country as a whole, however, shows an increase of from 25,900,000 barrels produced last year and 34,441,000 barrels expected this year. An increase in the national production of potatoes is also in prospect, it is stated. The national crop is expected to total 465,651,000 bushels, as compared to last year's crop of 408,964,000 bushels. The average for the years 1923-1927 is 384,491,000 bushels. This increase is shared in New England to a lesser degree, where 46,483,000 bushels are expected, compared to 45,598,000 last year. The crop, however, will fall short of the five year average of 47,240,000.

FORMER HALIFAX BOY COMMANDS EXPEDITION SHIP
BOSTON, Nov. 26.—Captain Seldon B. Boutlier, skipper of the auxiliary yacht Ilyria of the Field

Museum of Chicago Scientific Expedition, is a native of Halifax, N. S. Captain Boutlier was born in that city in 1880. He embarked on his seafaring career at the age of sixteen and during his many years at sea has served on and commanded many types of vessels. Beginning as a foremast hand he worked his way up to the command of sailing ships and steam vessels, serving as one of the Coastwise Transportation Company's skipper for twelve years. He now resides, when ashore, at 68 West Hill Avenue, Melrose, Mass. The Ilyria, a member of the New York Yacht Club fleet, underwent overhauling at a local shipyard and took on supplies there before embarking on a year's cruise in tropic waters, where members of the expedition expect to obtain many curious and little known trophies from the deep. Snakes, which travel on the surface of the water, some exceedingly poisonous, and which are thought by some to be responsible for tales of sea serpents, are among the specimens which it is hoped to secure. The yacht has a square-rigged foremast and her main mast is fore-and-aft rigged. She is big and ably and beautifully constructed, furnishing fine quarters for all aboard. For auxiliary power she is equipped with a multi-cylinder crank oil engine.

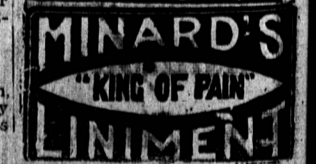
