SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON X. JUNE 9.

HEARING AND DOING.
Luke 6: 39-49.

GOLDEN TEXT.
"Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deluding your own selves."—James 1: 22.

POINTED SUGGESTIONS.
By Rev. D. W. Snider.

Keep the Sermon on the Mount as related by Matthew before you while giving your attention to to-day's lesson. It will help your understanding of it and deepen its significance. Study, for example, the relation of Matt. 7: 6 to vs. 41, 42 in the lesson. Uncharitable judgements beget characters as much to be abhorred as those infected by bestial outlawry.

How the thought, too, of such damning guilt drives one to a consciousness of the need of prayer lest he be overtaken in this fault, namely, the uttering of harsh and unwarranted judgements. See how the tenderness of Jesus anticipated that need in Matt. 7: 7-12. Note, too, how in Matt. 7: 13-14 the fitting thing is spoken in relation to matters which are hurtful to character. The broad way has room for them, but not the narrow.

The teacher who is blind to the limitations which the Kingdom of Heaven imposes upon man through the principles of righteousness it ordains can only lead his followers into the ditch whither he tends. And as the teaching of Jesus is in contrast with that of the play-acting Pharisees, the ditch may be named the confusion of hypocrisy. What can there be more pitiable than the plight of the unmarked hypocrite—unless it be that of his witless dupe!

But men are responsible for the masters they choose to follow. And they can never indulge themselves in the hope of being better than their masters or teachers. Their perfection is likely to be the imperfection of the teacher. Herein is the solemnity of being a teacher; but Jesus Christ, in all points perfect, feckless, stainless, can lead God's children unto glory.

Not much introspection is required to convince the one who is upon the point of charging another with his fault, that the sin which doth so easily beset himself is, in all likelihood a more grievous offence, even as a log to a ship, a beam to a silver. There is the brotherly way of correcting one another, but one must be assured of his brotherliness by all the dimensions of love before going forward with the business. He must be ready first for the pain of "log" extraction as from the nerves of the eye.

But the heart which abounds with love can do wonderful things and speak the searching truth. Love is the corrective of faults. It is the gulf-stream which shames the iceberg out of existence. It is the painless surgeon. It is the mother-soul of mankind.

Prayer is a good thing. The recognition of the greatness and goodness even of the Lordship of Jesus, is a thing to be commended—If. That if is mountainous. It is oceanic. It is spatial, as far as the East is from the West. But prayer, which soells obedience—overtops the mountain, and crosses the sea, and annihilates space and lives in meridian joys with God.

Life is the building of a character. And, as Gladstone said, all men are the builders of themselves. But there is the house of appearance, which cannot abide when flood-tests come. There is the house possibly of less elegance and of fewer appointments, which, however, endures all tests—either of fire or flood or the insidious corrosions of time.

What is the difference? It is in the foundation. The sayings of Jesus, His teachings, are the only bed-rock of character.
