

Hawks Tie Canadiens For First Place

Eke Out 2-1 Victory Over Montreal Team In Hard-Fought N.H.L. Game

MONTREAL, Jan. 16 (CP) — Rallying around goalie Mike Karakas, who turned in the most spectacular exhibition of puck stopping on Forum ice this season, Chicago Black Hawks eked out a 2-1 victory over Montreal Canadiens tonight to climb into a first place tie with Canucks atop the National Hockey League standings.

Canucks held a decisive edge on the play over Hawks from the opening whistle to the last wailing of the siren, but Karakas proved an impregnable barrier, turning aside one vicious shot after the other to avert what probably would have been a "certain" Chicago defeat.

After a scoreless initial period, Black Hawks sailed in front in the mid season on a goal by Red Hamill. Billy Reay knotted the count for Canucks in the opening minutes of the last frame but Hawks came rolling back and George Geasealped the verdict for Chicago with a solo effort.

Along with Karakas, the Black Hawks defence played a gradual game while the standout trio for

Montreal consisted of pivotman Billy Reay and winger Moe White and Murdo McKay. White arrived from overseas recently and was playing his first game for Canucks while Murdo, brought up from Buffalo Elsons, received his baptism of fire in the National Hockey League.

Bruins Come From Behind, Defeat N. Y. Rangers 3-2

BOSTON, Jan. 16 (AP) — After being held scoreless for 30 minutes, Boston Bruins set off a three-goal scoring burst to overtake New York Rangers for a 3-2 victory in the opener of their home-and-home National Hockey League series tonight before a packed 13,900 crowd at the Boston Garden.

Woody Dumart, aided by his Kitchener linemates, Milt Schmidt and Bobby Bauer, caused the "clutch" with less than five minutes to play.

While operating at top speed the Bruins were unable to get a shot on the New York net until the 18th minute of play and during the scoreless first session, the Rangers out-shot them by a 6-3 margin.

Both sides were crippled going into action and Rangers were forced to operate without such valued

stickmen as Alex Shibicky and Alfie Pike.

Joe Louis, Billy Conn To Fight In Yankee Stadium

NEW YORK, Jan. 16 (CP) — Joe Louis and Billy Conn will meet in Yankee Stadium after New York City, Wednesday night, June 19, in their "hot" heavyweight boxing championship return match, promoter Mike Jacobs announced today. He predicted the fight will draw the greatest gate in fight history.

The bout will give the Pittsburgh fighter his second shot at Louis' crown just five years and one day after the first meeting in 1911. Conn then came closer than any other challenger to dethroning the Brown Bomber, until Louis knocked him out in the 13th round.

Mike Jacobs Plans Four More Bouts

NEW YORK, Jan. 16 (AP) — After announcing that Joe Louis and Billy Conn would fight for the heavyweight title June 19 at the Yankee Stadium, promoter Mike Jacobs said today he is working on four other championship fights outdoors in New York this summer.

That battle was held in the Polo Grounds, across the Harlem River from the Bronx Borough Stadium, before a crowd of 60,071 and a gate of \$451,743. That "lake" Jacobs said today will be chicken feed compared to the probable gate for the June 19, an event that long has been expected to keynote the post-war sports boom in the United States.

Woodcock, Mills To Fight In May

LONDON, Jan. 16 (CP) — Freddie Woodcock, British and British Empire heavyweight boxing champion, will meet Freddie Mills, light heavyweight titleholder, in some of the best fights of the past few years will tackle the Summerville juvenile squad in the Western centre. Only one other boxing match ever drew more than 100,000 fans — the first Dempsey-Tunney bout in Philadelphia which attracted 120,757. Yankee Stadium has been host to three 100,000 bouts, headed by the \$1,083,530 paid to see the Dempsey-Jack Sharkey fight in 1927. The others were Louis' return bout with Schmeling and his go with Max Baer.
